A BOUQUET FOR HON. JOHN HART

English Municipal Publication Speaks Appreciatively of B.C. Method

In its issue of July 20 the Municipal Journal, published in England, has an appreciative article on the British Columbia public accounts under the heading "Public Accounts: A lesson for England," as follows:

British Columbia is a typical example of efficiency and loyalty in colonisation. From the accounting point of view it is also a good instance of that freedom and elasticity which youth so freely imparts into the rigidity of the home systems of an Old Country.

We have before us, in setting down these reflections, the published accounts of British Columbia, printed by authority of the Legislative Assembly for the fiscal year ending 31st March, 1922. After the formal preface to the volumes, consisting of two lines of print from the Minister of Finance and the Comptroller General, respectively, the whole spirit of the publication may be understood from the unofficial preface at the head of the index—"The form of the accounts should bring to light extravagance and inefficiency, and enable criticism to be usefully applied."

Education of Public
It can be said without reservation that the volume consistently maintains this note, namely, that the accounts are for the education of the public and give them the maximum assistance in applying useful and constructive, as well as destructive criticism. Those familiar with many similar publications at home will realise the force of this judgment of the British Columbia statement, but the book proves its worth when tested either by general or specific instances.

In general terms, the arrangement of the volume is simple, the sections are sequential and logical in order and in form, until we get to the statistical appendices, which might be improved in classification and, indeed, would form the nucleus of a separate section of the book, capable of arrangement in as good a form as the accounts themselves which precede the statistics.

Lo, a Balance Sheet

the government superior to anything published in Britain, and even making allowances for the comparative simplicity by a legislative assembly in British Columbia, there is sufficient to prove that the more complex conditions of national life in Great Britain do not render the publication of simple statements of accounts giving the nation's financial position, and its annual turnover in a simple form which could be understood by the people.

The details of the expenditure given in full, down to the humblest messenger's salary, would of course be too great at home for publication in a handy volume, but the way in which one can test the cost of various branches of the government of the province in relation to the return in cash form obtained from such outlay, is surprising. There is always, of course, the element of public benefit not to be expressed in cash form, to be derived from the outlay of a department like the public works, which has to be borne in mind and which no formal accounts, can satisfactorily illustrate. This, however, is a difficulty inherent in local government accounts and can only be tested, even approximately, by statistics as to the volume of work done, docks and harbors built, streets and roads constructed, and so on.

The volume is capable of improvement in this particular, and the statistical results or facts expressed in summarised statements of work done or in the form of costs per suitable unit of work done, might advantageously be incorporated in future volumes.

These accounts are, however, so far ahead of any publication by the British government, that it might almost appear captious to suggest the improvements mentioned.

count on the Gyros for support. Alderman Perry favored a combined committee.

Fred Seadden said he was unofficially representing the Moose Lodge which would help the cause along.

H. F. Pullen suggested that the Mayor appoint a committee from the various organizations which would get busy at once.

Rev. G. G. Hacker said there would undoubtedly be an appeal made through the churches and he was awaiting that appeal. He and all members of his church would, however, aid this drive.

J. C. Brady favored a general appeal to which he thought everyone would respond. He liked the idea of voluntary contributions without having to put a drive on for funds. A determined organized effort in a matter of this kind seemed a pitiable affair. Each club might assist in the way it felt would be easiest. 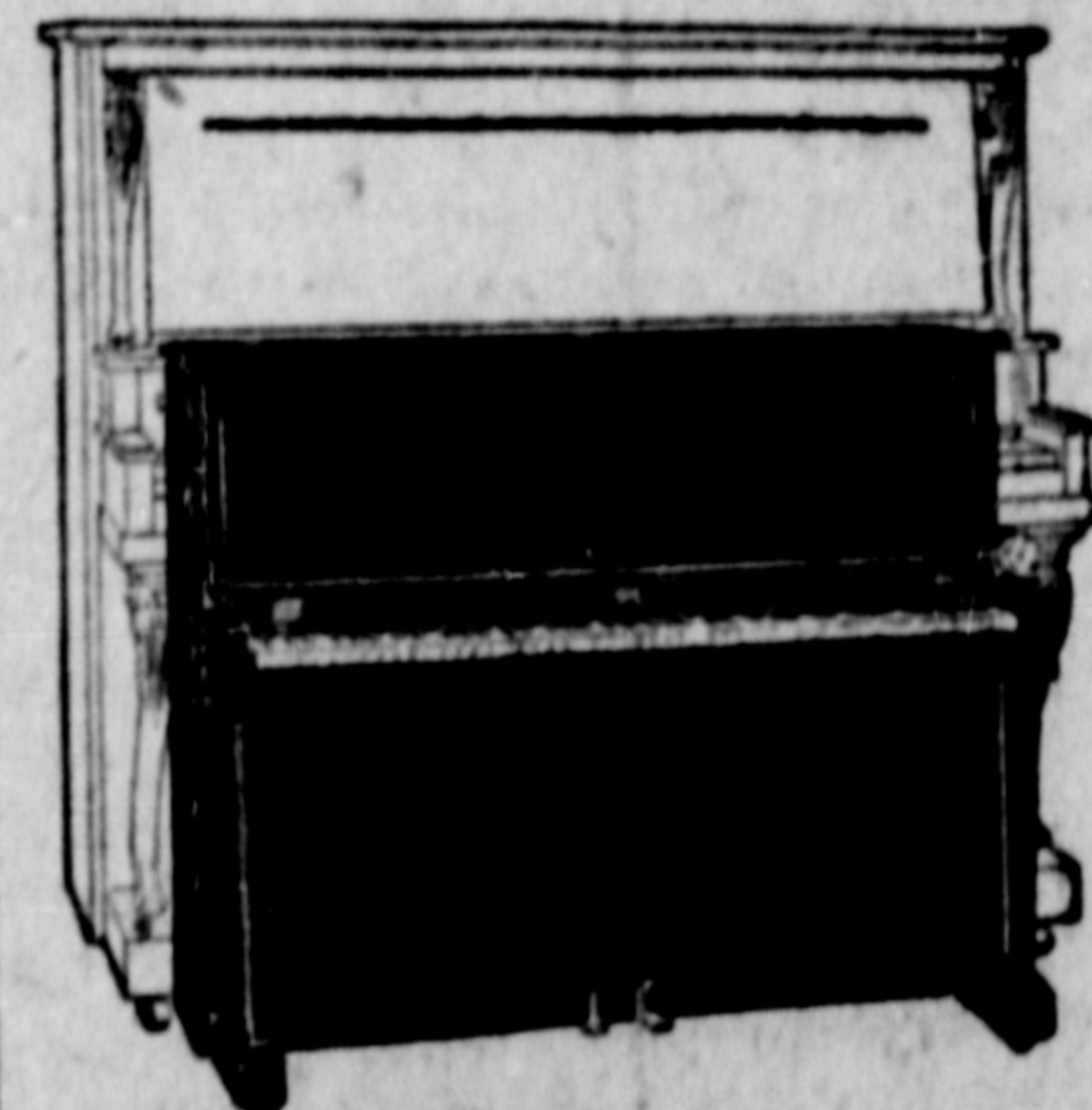
