RATHER TENSE SITUATION IN RUSSIA TODAY

TORNADO CAUSES MUCH LOSS OF LIFE IN TEXAS; PIRACY CASE IN CHINA

Swanson Bay Pulp Plant Lumber and Shingles Breaking all Records

Running night and day and turning out 50 tons of pulp per day in addition to large quantities of lumber and shingles, the plant of the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. at Swanson Bay is now breaking all production records of its history. H. Hennessy is the manager of the plant and J. A. Samuelson has arrived from Quebec to superintend the pulp making.

Nine carloads of pulp, shingles and lumber are being shipped weekly to Prince Rupert by car ferry behind the tug for transhipment East over the Canadian National Railway, and from 3 to 6 scows are sent weekly to Vancouver.

An order for 400,000 feet of lumber to be filled by May 15 for shipment to Japan is now being filled and in a few days one of the Canadian-Robert Dollar boats will come to load it.

The Princess Ena, Capt. C. C. Santley, loaded 500 tons of pulp at Swanson Bay for Frisco last week and is now at Port Alice, another of the company's plants, to complete loading a cargo of 1500 tons. The Ena, it is expected, will make still another trip to California with the Whalen product.

LIQUOR HEAD IS ARRESTED

George McLeod Charged With Taking Money Under False Pretences

VANCOUVER, May 14.—George McLeod, superintendent of liquor enforcement working under the Attorney General's department was arrested yesterday charged with obtaining money under false pretences. The charge carries the allegation that he collected money from liquor clubs.

McLeod is held under \$2,000 bail pending prosecution.

JAPANESE FISHERMAN BURIED ON SATURDAY

T. Yamamoto Was 44 Years of Age and Is Survived by Wife and Family at Dominion Cannery

The funeral of the late T. Yamamoto, Japanese, took place Saturday afternoon from Haynes Bros. chapel to Fairview Cemetery, Rev. H. Higashi, the Japanese mission, officiating.

Deceased, who was 44 years of age, died in the hospital last week after an illness of ten days. He was a fisherman at Dominion Cannery and is survived by a widow and three children.

SHIPS HELD BY ICE ON LAKE SUPERIOR

Held About Three Miles From Shore and Supplies Are Running Low

SAULT STE. MARIE, May 14.—The steamers Frank Ball, Cleatus Schneider and H. P. McIntosh were caught by ice floes in Lake Superior and have been held there by a strong wind three miles from shore for more than six days. It is feared their food supplies must be low but it is impossible to reach them with supplies. They must wait until the wind or thaw breaks up the ice jam.

SCATTER FACTORIES THROUGHOUT MICHIGAN

That Is Plan of Henry Ford to Make Spark Plugs, Valves and Other Auto Parts

DETROIT, May 14.—Plans which Henry Ford has long contemplated putting into execution will be realized shortly if the Michigan legislation passes a bill now before it giving corporations the right to condemn land for water purposes. Ford plans damming up small streams in many rural sections of Michigan with the idea of placing alongside each dam a small factory to make valves, spark plugs and other lighter automobile parts. He plans on regulating production of these plants so that the farmers and their families can find profitable employment.

Texas Tornado Brings Death to Many People on Farms and Ranches of Southern State

MOSCOW, May 14.—Thousands of demonstrators marched through the streets hanging effigies of Lord Curzon in protest at the British foreign secretary's ultimatum concerning British fishing vessels seized by the Soviet in neutral waters. The Soviet leaders addressed the mob saying Russia offered England a conference with the aim of settling the differences.

"Russia is anxious to avoid a clash, but if war comes the red army is ready," says Trotsky.

LONDON, May 14.—Labor organizations held a mass meeting in Hyde Park yesterday as a protest against the British ultimatum to Russia. The British government was denounced by several speakers. There were no disorders.

MOSCOW, May 14.—Soviet Russia's note to Great Britain, the text of which was given here today, was couched in conciliatory terms, expressing regretful surprise at the ultimatum. It proposes a conference with England to discuss the disputed questions.

RUSSIA BEGINS OBJECTION TO AERONAUTICS TARIFF CHANGE

Expects to Have 5,000 Aeroplanes Premier Dunning of Saskatchewan Takes Issue With Hon. W. S. Fielding

FRANCE STILL LEADS

NEW YORK, May 14.—Soviet Russia has begun the development of the Winnipeg convention in a great commercial and military aircraft program and which is the goal of Liberal occupies an important position.
