Sealed Tenders will be received by the Minister of Lands, at Victoria, not later than noon on the 22nd day of June, 1923, for the purchase of License X 5081, to cut 5,101,000 feet of Spruce and Hemlock, and 1,200,000 feet of felled and bucked spruce and hemlock, on an area situated on Limestone Bay, Louise Island, Queen Charlotte Islands Land District.

Two (2) years will be allowed for removal of timber.

HAROLD LLOYD IN DR. JACK

Best Yet of the Big Comedian's
Pictures Coming This

"Pictures with a thought" is what Harold Lloyd is after now. The spectacled comedian's success has been founded not only on his ability to put over his parts, as it has been in keeping up with the trend of taste in motion pictures.

While everyone was making slapstick comedies, and the picking was good, Lloyd looked forward a couple of years and decided that the roustabout brand of fun-making—the type in which the characters wear baggy pants and sling mud prodigiously—would not always have a great appeal; that is, for comedians of his calibre.

That was when he decided to pass up his "Lonesome Luke" character in which he wore tight fitting pants and double-barreled mustache—a character in which he won big success, and which led to his adopting the horn-rimmed glasses. From that time on, his progress was unbounded, and those who have followed his career have noted the steady improvement in every production.

In "A Sailor-Made Man" he enlarged on his own ideas of the kind of comedy the public was willing to accept from him, and his opinion was vindicated. He carried this step further in "Grandma's Boy." There were some who felt that Harold Lloyd had put too much story in this production, but audiences everywhere have given this analysis a boot.

When the plot of his latest feature comedy, "Dr. Jack," was conceived by Hal Roach, Sam Taylor and Jean Haves, Lloyd readily fell into the spirit of it because it had a real theme. He does not believe in a story that will submerge comedy, but he demands enough to hold the interest throughout.

It would be much easier for Lloyd to make pictures that would be just funny and which would lack story value, but he prefers the more difficult road, for he feels that the results to be obtained at the end of it will be much more generally gratifying, not only to audiences but to himself.
