

Logs are Being Shipped in Barges from Queen Charlotte Islands to United States Mill

Shipments of pulpwood in the log are now being made from the Queen Charlotte Islands to Port Angeles, Washington, for use in the manufacture of paper. The first shipment, consisting of 600,000 feet of spruce, was taken from Cumshewa Inlet to Port Angeles by the barge Vincennes recently.

The Vincennes, in tow of the tug Massett, took the shipment which was made by the Kelly Logging Co. to Washington Pulp & Paper Corporation. It instituted the barge shipments of pulp logs from the islands to Washington.

TOURISTS A FACTOR

VICTORIA, Sept. 29.—Reports that the government liquor sales lately averaged higher than \$1 .-000,000 a month are discredited by Hon. A. M. Manson, under whose department the liquor administration comes. "The liquor board might have sold \$1,000,000 worth of liquor during August when the peak was reached for the entire period since control came into force, but the monthly average has been considerably less than that, said Mr. Manson. The tourist business has been a very big factor in this summer's liquor trade."
