First Anniversary Of Public Library.

The interest which has been shown in this venture from the very outset, its steadily increasing growth in membership and circulation of books, has more than justified the faith of those who were first instrumental in arousing public opinion, and showing the necessity of such an institution in any city.

But while the interest of the public has been more than encouraging, the library this year received a severe blow when its request for money for new books in its estimates for 1923 was cancelled entirely by the city council. And it is because of this that the library board has planned a widespread campaign for money for new books to be held at the exhibition hall during fair wek.
