WAS HEALED AT MEETING

Victoria Doctor Pronounces Miss
Ruby Dimmick Cured of Cur-
vature

A letter has been received in the city by J. W. Ledlie from Rev. J. F. Dimmick, formerly of this city, telling of the healing of his daughter, Miss Ruby Dimmick at a meeting in the Metropolitan Church, Victoria, during one of Dr. Price's meetings.

According to the letter Miss Price had a curvature of the spine, and her right leg was drawn up so that it was an inch and a half shorter than the other. Her ankle joint had gone out and was separated so that there was fluid in the socket. This could be seen by the X-ray. This made the ankle so weak that she could not stand on it alone. She wore steel braces in her shoe to hold her ankle in place.

On April 20 she went with her father to the meeting and arrangements were made to pray over her, but before the time came, while the meeting was in progress just after the singing of a hymn the girl turned to her father, threw her arms around him and cried: "Oh, Dad, He's coming to me now; I feel Him through me." She praised and glorified God and thanked Him, and then pointing to the foot said: "Just look at my foot. It is going right out. Look at it." Her father looked and saw it go down into place. Miss Price says she felt her spine suddenly snap into place and she was healed.

The following Sunday Dr. Ernest Hall, who had been treating her, called to see her. He examined her spine and foot thoroughly and pronounced her in perfect condition and authorized a public statement to be made of the cure.

CRITICIZES BYLAWS

Editor Daily News:

In answer to the statements made by the Mayor and Chairman of Finance at a public meeting held in the city hall last Friday night, in support of the money bylaws about to be voted on. It was stated by both speakers that if the Booth School by-law was not endorsed by the voters, that \$55,000 extra would have to be levied on this year's taxes to pay for the repairs of that school. That statement is incorrect.

Last year's council provided about \$50,000 from last year's taxes for that work. The School Board this year has provided for the remaining \$5,000 in their extraordinary estimates to be raised by the school rates this year. The city council of this year has not to provide one dollar in their general levy for the repairs to Booth School.

Increase Debt
If this bylaw is indorsed, the city debt will be increased \$55,000. We will have to pay 6 per cent interest on that amount for 26 years. This year's council has no right to submit this by-law, the policy of a council capitalizing a previous council's general expenditure should not be endorsed. As a rate-payer, I will vote against this by-law in the best interests of the city. I believe that if last year's council had not spent that money on Booth School, it would have been spent on something else possibly not as useful.

Mays Creek Bridge
The rate payers are entitled to more information on this bylaw than has been supplied to them up to the present. In fact, we have no trustworthy information supplied to us, as to plans, cost, or whether the steel bridge contractors have fully relinquished their contracts or not. Rumor

states they have not. We have a right to know why a steel bridge should be substituted with a wooden bridge.

The mere plebaid statements by laymen on such questions is to be deplored. When the city engages experts to advise on such subjects we have a right to hear from them direct.

The way the council has dealt with Hay's Creek bridge question does not appear to me to be good public business, they have wasted about five months of time and now recommend a temporary structure instead of a permanent structure. I consider the difference in price all in favor of the steel bridge and as this question is merely a plebiscite, I shall stay with the steel bridge.
