Sealed Tenders will be received by the Minister of Lands, at Victoria, not later than noon on the 22nd day of June, 1923, for the purchase of Licence X 5081, to cut 5,101,000 feet of spruce and Hemlock, and 1,200,000 feet of felled and bucked spruce and Hemlock, on an area situated on Limestone Bay, Louise Island, Queen Charlotte Islands Land District.

Two (2) years will be allowed for removal of timber.

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SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre, second class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation makes improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, to terminate certificate of pre-emption and transfer his claim.

Record without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may sell or otherwise dispose of his tenure land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads. Title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payment of fees of taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of His Majesty's Forces, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry, provision for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.

WILDEST NEW YORK SHOWN IN PICTURE

Beautiful and Damned with Marie Prevost and **Night Life** Setting With **Beautiful Flapper Centre** of Scene.

Wicked old New York, its unsavory dives, its white lights, its cafes and cabarets, is shown as a voracious dragon slaying all adventurers in the screen version of F. Scott Fitzgerald's novel, "The Beautiful and Damned," featuring Marie Prevost, which will be shown at the Westholme Theatre tonight.

Especially the New York between Forty second and Seventy-second Streets on one side, and Fifth Avenue and Broadway on the other, where all the theatres and cabarets are centered, and where is found the most motley collection of humanity ever thrown and huddled into one spot.
