

A report from the housing committee was read at the meeting of the city council, held last night in the city hall, on the question of the disposal of the house occupied by W. J. Sloan under the soldier's housing scheme. Mr. Sloan had offered to pay \$100 down and \$40 per month to clear up the arrears of \$600 due thereon. This offer was turned down and the city clerk was instructed to advertise the house for rent with a view to receiving applications for the eventual acceptance of the best offer.
