Other pilots put their men through workouts before lunch, to keep their muscles limber. Cobb, on the other hand, maintains that morning practice does more harm than good. He declares that if players work out before lunch, then go to the shower and relax for a few hours before the game time in the afternoon, their muscles are not as flexible as they should be. His practice is to have his men on the field shortly after noon, and he sends them through their paces then. By game time, he believes, the player's muscles are fully limbered and the player himself is in best physical fettle for the game.
