Abolition of Mountain Rates on Railways is asked by the People of Peace River Country

GRAND PRAIRIE, Nov. 21.—The abolition of all mountain rates either for freight or passenger traffic and the establishment of a fair through rate on such traffic, was today asked of the Board of Railway commissioners sitting here to hear applications of the Peace River country regarding railway rates.

The Peace River people asked the commissioners for lower and fairer through rate on grain to the head of the lakes and to Vancouver which will place the Peace River farmer here Death on as fair a basis as the Edmonton farmer.

BEER CLUBS TO BE WIPED OUT

Attorney General Manson Tells of Government Plans and Upbraids Municipalities

VICTORIA, Nov. 21. - Proprietary beer clubs now operating all over the province of British Columbia will be completely wiped out by new legislation to be introduced during the presout newsjon of the Logislature, Hon, A. M. Manson, attorney general, told the delegates to the union of B.C. - Municipalities, who waited on the Premier and ministers to discuss municipal affairs yesterday.

The municipalities have not assisted the government in enforcing the liquor laws, Mr. Manson declared, he added that some municipal officers should have been sent to jail. He asked the municipalities to preach respect for the law. If this was done conditions would improve fifty per cent.
