PICNIC WAS BIG SUCCESS

Three Hundred Persons Spent Yesterday at Digby Island With Pioneers

Yesterday will go down in the annals of the city's history as the day on which the Old Timers of the district held a most successful re-union, the occasion being the annual picnic at Digby Island, held under the auspices of the Pioneer Association. The weather was ideal and, from 10.30 in the morning until 2.30 in the afternoon, the Pachena, Launch 23, Rosina B., and an auxiliary fleet of smaller pleasure craft transported some 300 happy picnickers across to the island.

An abundance of good things to eat was provided and there was a splendid variety program of sport to suit both young and old.

John Dybhavn, president of the association, in a short speech suitable to the occasion, mentioned that he considered certain records of the happenings and growth of the city should be kept by the association which would undoubtedly be of great interest to succeeding generations.

Fred Stork Speaks

Fred Stork, M.P., in a brief speech, remarked how the pioneers of the city could recall things as they were in the early days and could compare with pride the city of Prince Rupert of today. Although the city had been through its ups and downs every other place of any proportions had gone through the same phase of things. He had been all over the country and from his personal observations he was convinced that we were as well, if not better, off here as anywhere. He concurred with the remarks of Mr. Dybhavn and thought that the association should appoint a scribe, or some suitable person, to gather all matters of historical interest which would be of great service in the future.

Major Newton spoke of the beautiful climate of the north which was not excelled in any other part of the world. He mentioned that he had recently received a letter from Ernest A. Woods, former city clerk, who was now in Portland, Oregon, in which he stated that it had been raining there since last May. Speaking of the suggestion as to the gathering of data, etc., on happenings of public interest, in which he fully concurred, he thought it would not be amiss at the present time to erect several totem poles in conspicuous points in the city. These would be of particular interest to tourists and would at the same time tend to preserve an art which was slowly vanishing.
