

Premier Poincaire, in what is Believed Reply to Overtures of Britain, Gives no Ground

SENLIS, France, July 16 .- President Poincare on Sunday proclaimed the French government's unalterable decision to tand resolutely for complete execution of the Versailles Treaty with Germany's debt of 132,000,000,000 gold marks as agreed upon by the Allies at the London conference and against any international finance committee to replace the reparations commission. The premier declared that France was finished making concessions to Germany and was tired of tampering with that country.
