ARMY SCHEME IMMIGRATION

Fine Lot of Boys Arrive at Montreal from Britain

REPAY PASSAGE MONEY

MONTREAL, Quebec, June 11.—With smiling faces and eyes eagerly taking in their new surroundings a large Salvation Army party of 150 boys under the care of Lieut. Col. Onslow Edwin, arrived in Montreal yesterday from Quebec where they arrived from England on board the liner Megantic. Travelling by special train over the Canadian National railways the party left almost immediately for Winnipeg where they will be distributed amongst various selected farms and kept under the observation of officers of the Army from time to time. Of an average age of sixteen years, the boys were all of a remarkable fine type typically British, with clear blue eyes and flaxen hair looking forward to their future life in the Dominion.

Talking for a few moments while their train was being switched Lt. Edwin stated that the boys had been recruited from good homes in Scotland and England and were the first party to come forward under the New Empire Settlement act recently passed by the British Parliament in conjunction with the governments of Canada and Australia. Before sending them to the colonies, stated the Colonel, the Army gives the boys from six to eight weeks training in the city work shops of the organization, teaching them how to drive nails, how to saw wood, to set chisels, how to approach and to harness a horse, how to mend their boots and wash their clothes. After this preliminary training the boys are sent to Hadley Farm, Essex, where they are kept for another six or eight weeks and shown how to milk a cow, hoeing, wood chopping, etc., so that when the boys come out of this training, while they are not in any sense farmers, they are more or less familiar with things that will be of some service to them later on.

Method of Handling

Lieut. Col. Edwin stated that the Salvation Army works fifty-fifty with the British government and it is calculated that with the training which the army gives to each boy, the outfit supplied, passage money and from two to three years after care and supervision the total cost for each boy is from £50 to £75 for the whole period. The boys each deposit an amount of £5 if they are able, some put down nothing at all, and they are then loaned jointly by the Army and the British government an amount not exceeding £25 and the balance of £25, or £30 is a gift from the British authorities and the Salvation Army combined.

"The Government of Canada" stated the Colonel, "is giving us some financial assistance but we calculate that the deficit on each boy amounts to about £8 on arrival in Canada. The boys are being placed on approved farms and here it is interesting to note that the Salvation Army headquarters in Winnipeg now have on file over one thousand applications from Western farmers for juvenile help. The boys receive from the farmers \$2 per week pocket money with their board and lodging while the cash balance of the boys wages are paid to the Salvation Army in

repayment of the original loan and it is figured at the end of two years the boys will in this way have repaid the bulk of their obligations to the army.

Commissioner Lamb's Plan
 Lieut. Col. Edwin stated that the new scheme was the result of a recent visit to Canada of Commissioner Lamb, the well-known Salvation Army leader in Great Britain and that he, Lieut. Col. Edwin, was personally conducting the present party to see that all arrangements worked smoothly. If all went well, Col. Edwin stated, that the army hoped to settle in either Canada or Australia within the next twelve or eighteen months fully ten thousand boys.

He pointed out that the boys were of exceptionally good families and that in later years would make just the kind of citizens that Canada is so badly in need of at the present time.

GOOD TOBACCO GROWN ONTARIO

British Buyer Arrives in Montreal to Look Over Situation for Season

MONTREAL, June 11.—Canadian tobacco is best grown in any of the British Colonies stated W. J. Keeley, head of the well known British tobacco importing firm of W. J. Keeley & Company, Derby, England, who arrived in Montreal yesterday on board the White Star dominion liner Megantic for a few weeks visit to this country. Mr. Keeley is particularly interested in the tobacco

growing area situated in and around Essex, Ontario, and after a short stay in Montreal, is proceeding to Toronto and on to Essex to look after this year's prospects for tobacco.

"Many Canadians" stated Mr. Keeley, "do not realize what a fine grade of tobacco is being grown in Ontario and it may be of interest to know that the Essex district alone exported to Great Britain last year, over one million pounds of tobacco for use in making up cigarettes, pipe tobacco and twists."

Tobacco from Canada, stated Mr. Keeley, is looked upon very favorably by the British importers and manufacturers on account of its superior flavor and in this respect is ahead of tobacco imported from other British colonies such as South Africa and Rhodesia while at the same time it compares very favorably with that imported from the United States. Great Britain imports annually, stated Mr. Keeley over 150,000,000 pounds of tobacco and of this amount by far the greatest quantity is obtained from the United States particularly Virginia.

Referring to supplies from the Province of Quebec, Mr. Keeley stated that all tobacco received from this source went into the making of cigars. The British importers were not particularly enthusiastic on Quebec tobacco on account of several bad shipments which were received in England last year, the tobacco being damp.
