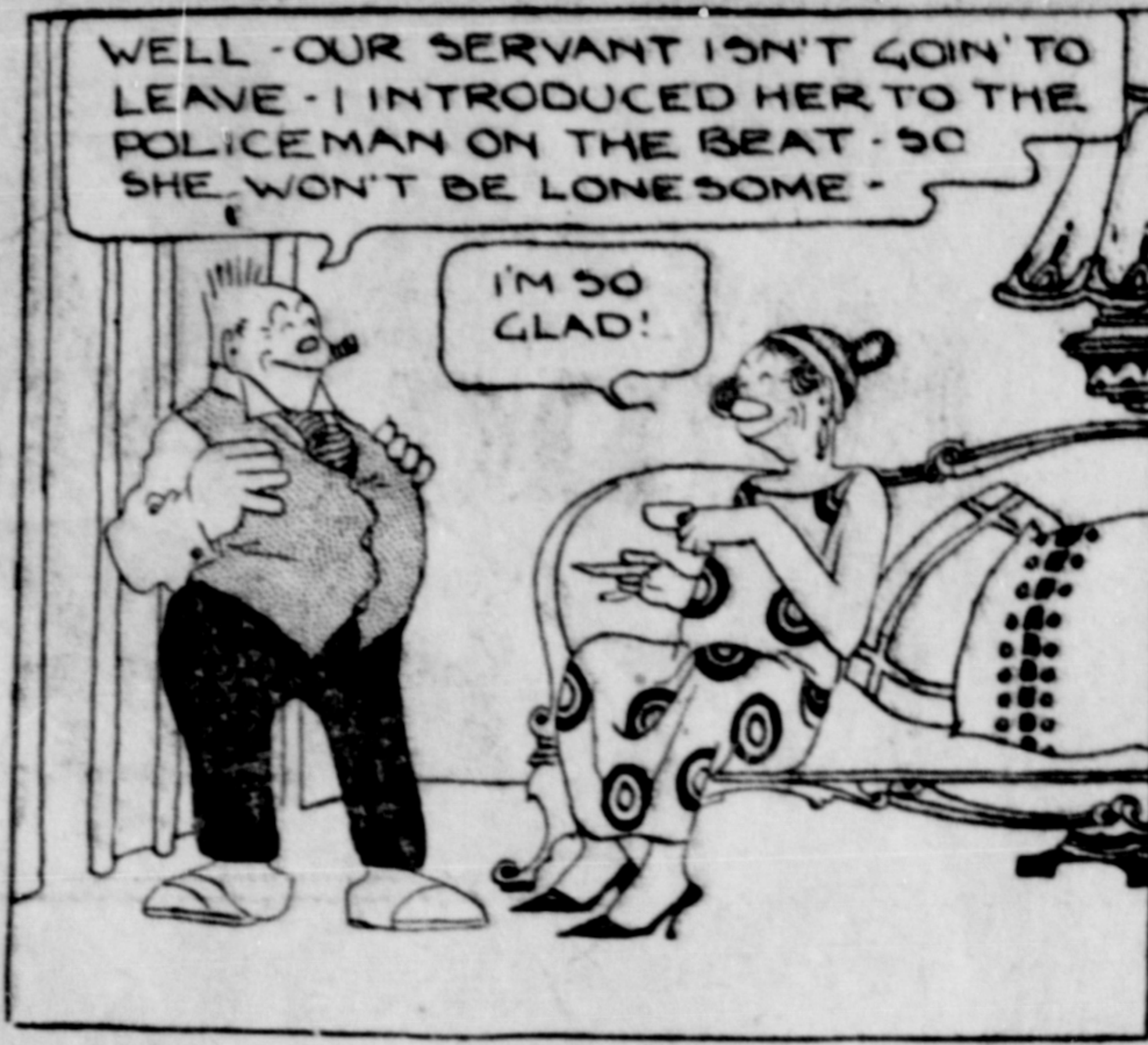

Winners of Scholarships Leave Winnipeg to Take Course in Practical Farming

WINNIPEG, Aug. 2.—The four young English girls, winners of the Sir Henry Thornton scholarship, who have spent the past seven weeks in Western Canada, left tonight for Guelph to enter the Ontario Agricultural College for a short course in practical farming. For the past five weeks these "farmerettes" have been at the Manitoba College, where they have been studying animal husbandry, poultry, dairying, horticulture, and many other subjects pertaining to agriculture and even carpentry. Before leaving the college the girls elected Prof. C. H. Lee an honorary member of their organization, the Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs of Great Britain, presenting him with their club badge. During their stay in Winnipeg and while travelling to the coast over the National route, the girls made many friends and stated when leaving that they very much regretted that they could not remain in the West.
