## LOWER PRICE OF GASOLINE

City Council Endorses Resolution of Board of Trade with this End in View

On motion of Ald. Collart, seconded by Ald. Stephens, the city council last night endorsed the resolution of the Board of Trade protesting against excessive prices for gasoline and distillate here as compared with those prevailing in Ketchikan. The resolution states that gasoline and distillate prices here are 26.5c and 18.5c as compared with 17.4c and 15c, respectively at Ketchikan and that such prices have a damaging effect on this port in that they cause Canadian boats to go to Ketchikan to outfit. It asks the Department of Trade and Commerce to approach the Imperial Oil Co. with a view to producing cheaper fuel or invite the Shell Oil Co. to come here to compete in the business.

In reporting on the matter, City Solicitor Jones stated that the local manager of the Imperial Oil Co. had accounted for the higher prices here in that a contract between the Standard Oil Co. and the British Oil Co. in Peru made it obligatory to keep the price of gasoline and distillate up in Canada.

Ald. Collart took the view that such an explanation was merely a bluff.

#### THE SETTLERS' VIEWPOINT.

Editor Daily News: It is all very nice for the immigrant settling along a line of railway to have trains passing day after day bringing and carrying away produce.

The immigrant who lives near the cities and industrial plants will have his roadways with steamers coming and going day by day. Revenue for the railways and steamships. Votes for the representatives appear the desired object.

How in the world will the outside places be built up if everything centres around cities, or along the lines of railway? British Columbia is a very large country. The water frontage covers thousands of miles. Lonely settlers take up land, but they become discouraged with a monthly or fortnightly mail and freight service. Even when a settlement is organized of a few dozen men with their wives and families, little consideration is given.

The settler is met with the cry, "It don't pay to run steamers to your settlement." Just consider the cost of the railways in building and running expenses. Look over the cost of government with the public debt piling up year by year. See the highways and byways in the neighborhood of

places where votes are a consideration and estimate where the revenue is derived and the amount expended for building up the country.

Our fish, our timber resources, our mines are the real producers for export. Our farms are the means of conserving the wealth by producing food for home consumption. What use is producing minerals, timber and fish if the revenue derived therefrom is expended outside the country.

We talk about "back to the land!" Easily said. The settler must be retained on the land if the country is expected to go ahead. It is all very well to talk about dealing in commodities, and gold is only a commodity. The real value is in those who provide the food we require—over and over what the producer needs.

Give the settler roads; give him steamer service; give him a means of disposing of his spare produce, instead of building up cities and towns with "drones," living on one another.

Ald. Stephens moved that the communication be received and filed and Ald. Macdonald seconded. This was carried, Ald. Munro voting contrary.
