Harold McEwen, C.N.R. division freight agent, sailed last night by the Prince Rupert for Vancouver on company business.

T. Mason, inspector of customs, arrived from Victoria on the Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon and will leave for Prince George on tonight's train.

J. C. McLennan has been re-appointed city assessor for the year 1924 at a salary of \$600. A recommendation from the finance committee to this effect was adopted by the city council last night.

H. W. Birch, secretary of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association, reports to the city treasurer that there were 989 hospital days treatment at the institution during the month of September.

The will of the late William George Barrie of Prince Rupert was probated last week in Vancouver. He left a net estate of \$16,581 to his son, William John Earl Barrie, of Peterborough, Ont. This includes the furniture business in this city.

Hon. Ernest Lapointe was to leave Ottawa Sunday and expected to arrive at Vancouver at the week end. He will there take up the matter of False Creek foreshore with the provincial government and it is expected he will come to Prince Rupert after his south coast business is completed.

J. Pinder Moss, director of the Northern Polytechnic Institute says that he has just received word from Hazelton that high school classes both senior and junior are being organized at New Hazelton in connection with the polytechnic and at Hazelton a prospector's geology class is in course of organization.

The funeral of the late John V. Anderson, who died last week in the General Hospital, took place this morning at 10:30 from the chapel of the B.C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Rev. J. J. Smithson officiating. Emmett Anderson, son of the deceased, arrived in the city from Stewart to be present at the obsequies.

George Eastman of Rochester, New York, millionaire inventor of the kodak, who has been on a six weeks' big game hunting expedition in the Gassiar mountains, will arrive in the city by the steamer Princess Alice Friday evening enroute south to Vancouver where he will leave for the East on his private car "Manhattan."

J. W. Grader, auditor of the Audit Bureau of Circulations, arrived in the city last night and is today investigating the circulation records of this paper. He will be here until Thursday night. He is on a tour from Chicago and his last stop was at Edmonton. The daily papers at Vancouver and Victoria are all members of the bureau. The Daily News is the only paper audited by the Bureau here.

Ald. Gollart drew the mayor's attention at last night's council meeting to the fact that the curfew law was not being lived up to. Children, he alleged, were wandering the streets after 10 o'clock and even up to midnight. This should not be allowed and the mayor should look into it. Mayor Newton replied that a laxity in the law had been allowed during the long summer evenings but the situation, now that the nights were drawing in, was becoming different.

The city council last night received a letter from the secretary of the B.C. Transprovincial Highway Association urging the endorsement of the Fraser River route against the Hope-Prince Rupert route. The communication was referred to the Finance Committee for report. Mayor Newton and Ald. Stephens took the view that any route passing through Prince George would be of more advantage to this city than one going further south. Eventually the proposed road out of this city might link up with it.
