REMOVING PULP FROM DAMAGED CAR FERRY

Will go to Dry Dock to Have Cars Lifted Off—Craft Will be Inspected and Repaired if Necessary

The pulp out of the three remaining cars of the Swanson Bay ferry which met with an accident yesterday morning down the coast is being unloaded at the lumber assembly wharf today and will be shipped East in other cars. It was not damaged.

After the cargo is unloaded, the car ferry will be taken up to the dry dock where the upset cars will be removed with the big derrick. The ferry itself will then go up on the pontoons for examination and such repairs as are found necessary. It is to be put in service again with all the despatch possible.

Local railway officials held an investigation of the accident yesterday afternoon. The cars, which went overboard, it is understood sunk although word was sent out to shipping yesterday by a wireless to watch out for them in case, through the buoyancy of the pulp, they might still be floating.

BUT FEW OF BRITISH HARVESTERS RETURN

It is Expected that Most of Them Will Remain in Canada

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—With the end of the harvest season in sight, only 347 of the British harvesters or rather less than three per cent of the total of 11,718 who came to the country this year have booked their return passage, according to the returns of all steamship companies. It is believed that most of those not booked will remain in Canada.
