Sport Chat

A boxer in order to get into the best possible condition must be very careful as to how he trains. While it is not necessary to go to extremes, like the boxers of the old school were required to do, it is necessary for the boxer to be methodical in all his habits. He must be the possessor of a good, strong, healthy normal body. The man who is broken down by excesses of any kind will not go far in the boxing game. The train-

ing must be taken along gradually so as not to injure the boxer before he is properly schooled and conditioned. It is equally important that the mental training be watched and just as carefully developed. One should start off with the simple fundamentals such as running, rope skipping, bag punching, body exercises, shadow boxing and other forms of light exercise to strengthen the body. One should never feel tired or exhausted when leaving the gymnasium. Regularity in all habits such as meals and hours of retiring should be strictly observed.

In boxing the value of delivering a blow correctly must absolutely be learned. One should always hit with the front of the knuckles and hold the fist so there will be a straight line along the forearm to the knuckles. Distance should be judged correctly so that effort in striking will not be wasted. It is well worth while to spend considerable time in thoroughly mastering straight hitting, hooking and uppercutting. It should always be remembered that a straight line is the shortest distance between two points and also that the success of any blow depends on its speed and unexpectedness. A boxer should not try to land a knockout blow every time he strikes but should reserve the best until the proper opportunity presents itself. Careful attention should be paid to the position of the hands, arms and feet and the muscles should not be tensed until the proper moment for striking. To make the blow more effective, the weight of the shoulder and body should be put behind it. The boxer who uses his brain when training and competing is a hard man to beat. It is the systematic and not the mechanical training that counts. The boxer should always have a system and should plan his movements out in advance.
