

UPPER PRICES DOWN A LITTLE

Producers Holding Firmly at
Seventeen Cents But Can Be
Bought For Less

NEW YORK, March 22.—The price of electrolytic copper is slightly weaker. While all the larger producers are holding firm at 17 cents delivered, with a considerable tonnage sold at that price, copper can be bought in important directions at somewhat under 16 7/8 cents delivered. Second-hands are still willing to sell at 16 1/2 cents aside ship New York, while abroad English dealers are selling as low as 16.95 cents c.i.f.

While the amount of copper offered under 17 cents is in fair amount in the domestic market, it is not thought that any material breakdown price will occur, as most producers are sold well ahead, with consumers as yet uncovered on considerable of the metal which they must buy to cover commitments that are being held for placing later in the second quarter.

Demand abroad is in fair volume, but being satisfied mainly by foreign dealers, although Copper Export Association has sold a fair tonnage to France and England during the last 24 hours.

Mine Output

The mine output of copper still is 20,000 pounds a month below world consumption, and everything still favors producers as to prices rather than consumers. The present slight weakness is due to smaller demand during the last two weeks such as is to be expected before the start of another buying movement. Price of electrolytic copper for domestic shipment is 16 7/8 to 17 cents a pound delivered to the end of June, with a slight willingness to sell into July. Lake copper is 17 1/8 cents delivered to the end of May. Price aside ship New York is 16 1/2 cents with producers unwilling to meet the price. Prices for European destinations from American producers are at levels corresponding with 17 to 17 1/8 cents c.i.f. Hamburg or London.

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B.C. DINNER HELD IN LONDON

W. Turnbull, Former Editor of
Daily News One of Those
Present

In spite of the very short notice given of the intention to hold a British Columbian dinner in London, the response was most satisfactory and some 40 people sat down to dinner at the Trocadero on Saturday last, says "Canada" in a recent issue.

This is the first British Columbian dinner that has been held in London for many years, and everyone present united in most warmly welcoming that veteran British Columbian, Mr. J. H. Turner, an ex-Premier of the Province, and for so many years its Agent-General in London.

In reply to the toast of his health, which was proposed in a graceful speech by F. C. Wade, Mr. Turner, in spite of his 90 years, kept his audience interested and charmed by his reminiscences of England 80 years ago, and of the progress and events in British Columbia during his long residence in the Province. The effect of delivering a speech, covering so wide a ground and dealing with so many half-forgotten personalities, would have been a fine achievement for any septuagenarian, and was a very conspicuous triumph for Mr. Turner.

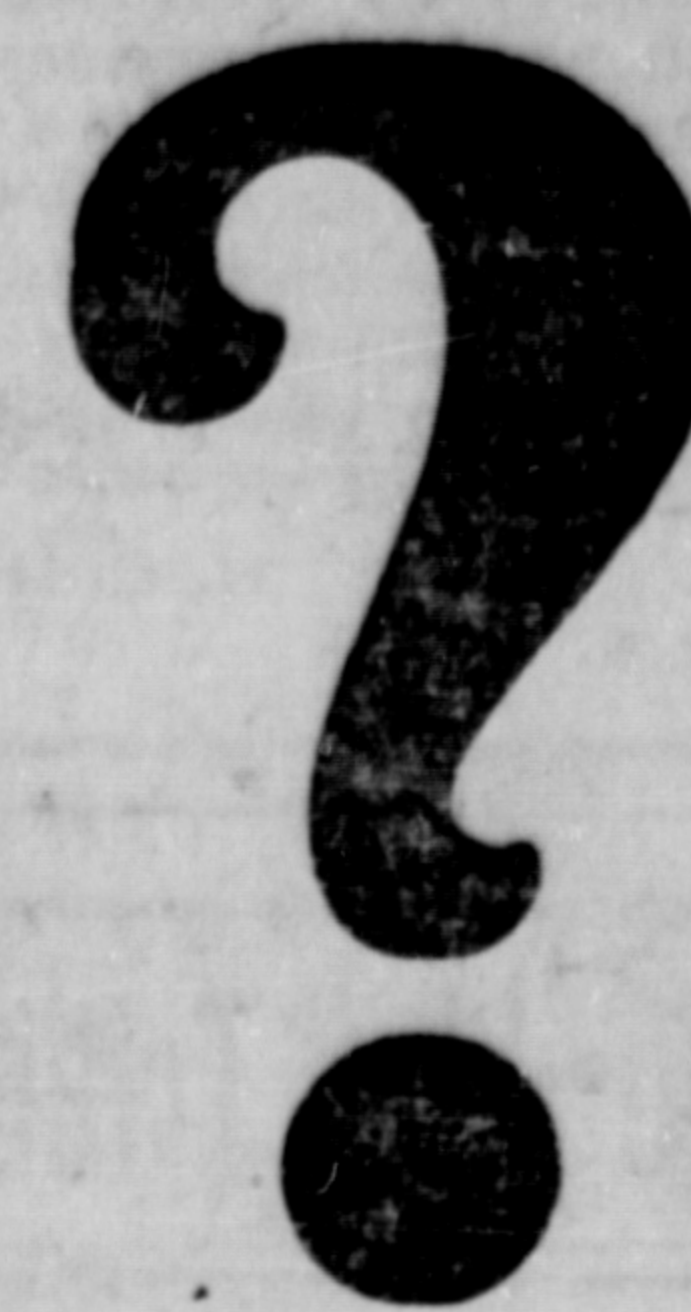
Give Reminiscences

Many of those were called upon during the course of the evening to give their reminiscences of British Columbia, and there was a strong expressed sentiment that there should be periodical dinners at which British Columbians could meet together in London. One member stated that had the notice of the dinner not been so short he could himself have brought 50 more to such a gathering.

Mr. Wade was the recipient of many tributes to his great activity and the efficiency of his work, which was doing so much for the development of the province; and in the course of a thoughtful speech the Agent-General indicated some of the lines of activity already in operation, and others which with the co-operation of all Canadian interests in London could become increasingly active and beneficial. Among other proofs of the commercial progress of the Province, he referred to the great increase in lumber exports and the growth of grain shipments through the port of Vancouver. Col. Rae, instance, as a proof of British Columbia's activity, the great harbor works being carried out on the Gold Coast by General Stewart, which in turn had led to increasing attention being given to the development of that Colony by British Columbians.

Sir G. McL. Brown referred to the many pleasant memories he had of the Province, in which he spent so many years; and H. B. Thomson drew attention to the necessity of translating into action the expressed desire of closer relationships between the Oversea Dominions and the

Mother Country, which was always a prominent feature of such gatherings.

Mr. Pellow-Harvey referred to the increasing interest now shown in British Columbian mining, and stated that at the present time several important groups in the city were examining mining properties in the Province.
