**INTERESTING LECTURE
BY ADJUTANT W. KERR**

Salvation Army Officer Shows
Pictures of and Describes
"Ten Years in Yukon
and Alaska."

The Salvation Army citadel was crowded to the doors last evening when Adjutant William Kerr delivered a highly interesting illustrated lecture taking as his subject "My Ten Years in Alaska and the Yukon." The large audience was very appreciative.

Starting at Vancouver Adjutant Kerr showed views from there to the Arctic Circle which he lucidly explained and described the most of them having been taken by himself. Pictures were shown of points of scenic interest, towns such as Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert, Anyox, Stewart, places along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and along the Alaskan Pan handle from Ketchikan to Skagway. Various industries modes of life, both white and native, were described. Pictures depicting the Yukon gold rush; mushing on the trails, and the various mining operations at Dawson were highly interesting. Views down the Yukon River from Dawson to Fort Yukon including one of the midnight sun concluded the exhibition.

A special item on the program were two selections by a vocal octette consisting of Capt. and Mrs. Coleman, Mr. Coleman.

**PRINCE RUPERT IS
NAMED HEADQUARTERS**

Department of Naval Service to
Recruit Here for Royal
Canadian Naval
Reserve

Prince Rupert is named as one of the points at which headquarters will be established by the department of naval service for receiving applications from men wishing to enter the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve of 500 officers and men now being organized. It is announced by the department of naval defense, Ottawa, that registrars will be appointed at each local headquarters to receive applications, and that the selection of officers by the department of naval service will be completed early in November.

Headquarters of the R.C.N.R. will be established also at Victoria, Vancouver, Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Lunenburg, Halifax and Charlottetown. Naval training at the naval bases of Halifax or Esquimaux will be given to R.C.N.R. ratings during the winter months.

Applications must be British subjects domiciled in Canada, must not belong to any other reserve force, must be willing to serve at sea or wherever required must sign engagements for five consecutive years and must in most cases follow the sea as a profession. It is stated by the department that many officers and men of the Canadian merchant marine, as well as fishermen, have applied for entry into the reserve.
