LONDON, Dec. 18. — King George of Greeces is expelled CONDITION OF MR. from the country and it is expected a republic will follow. The people will probably decide by plebiscite on the form of government the country will adopt.

The expulsion of King George drew forth the comment Improvement Noted Yestercay day. democracy manifested by the countries of Europe during the past six years.

George of Greece represents the tenth king who has been forced to make his exit since the FORT FRASER GIRL Monarchs previously affeeted being those of Russia, Germany, Austria, Bulgaria, Ferdinand of Montenegro, Turkey. VICTORIA, Dec. 18 .- British Columbia people are refusing to take the present liquor act seriously and they should be given the opportunity on a vote on the sale of beer by the glass to declare if they would respect such a system, Hon. A. M. Manson declared in the Legislature when he explained his new liquor plebiscite legislation.

Mr. Manson declared himself against a prohibition plebiscite now. The present liquor system, he declared, had not been given sufficient time yet to warrant a prohibition vote. It would
