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MOVING OF GRANDVIEW HOTEL BEFORE COUNCIL

Mr. Postulo Agrees to Make Extensive Alterations But Council Wants Further Report on Matter

The application of J. Postulo for permission to remove the Grandview Hotel from its present location on First Avenue beyond Eighth Street to the corner of First Avenue and Seventh Street at the rear of the post office and a report from the Board of Works pertaining thereto was tabled for a week by the city council last night.

The Board of Works report, the adoption of which was moved by Ald. Munro and seconded by Ald. Mackenzie, recommended that permission be granted provided that the floor joists be doubled, the building be plastered, electric wiring be installed, a bond be provided against damage to private property or streets in moving and a fireproof roof be put on to bring the building under the requirements of the building bylaw. Ald. Munro reported that Mr. Postulo had agreed to make the changes and the city engineer stated that he had no objection provided the requirements were adhered to.

Ald. Collart inquired if the rooms were of the size as required in the bylaw regulating rooming houses and the granting of licenses. Mayor Newton, Ald. Munro and Ald. Perry took the view that this did not enter into the present question, and was a matter for Mr. Postulo to look after.

Finally, after some discussion, an amendment was moved by Ald. Stephens and seconded by Ald. Collart that the report be laid over until it was ascertained if Mr. Postulo could secure a license.

The amendment carried on the following division: Aye, Ald. Stephens, Collart, Smith, Macdonald and Currie; Nay, Ald. Perry, Ald. Munro and Ald. Mackenzie.

And, too, it may serve as a mentor for the Dominion and the Congress of the United States to get busy and become real brother and sister.

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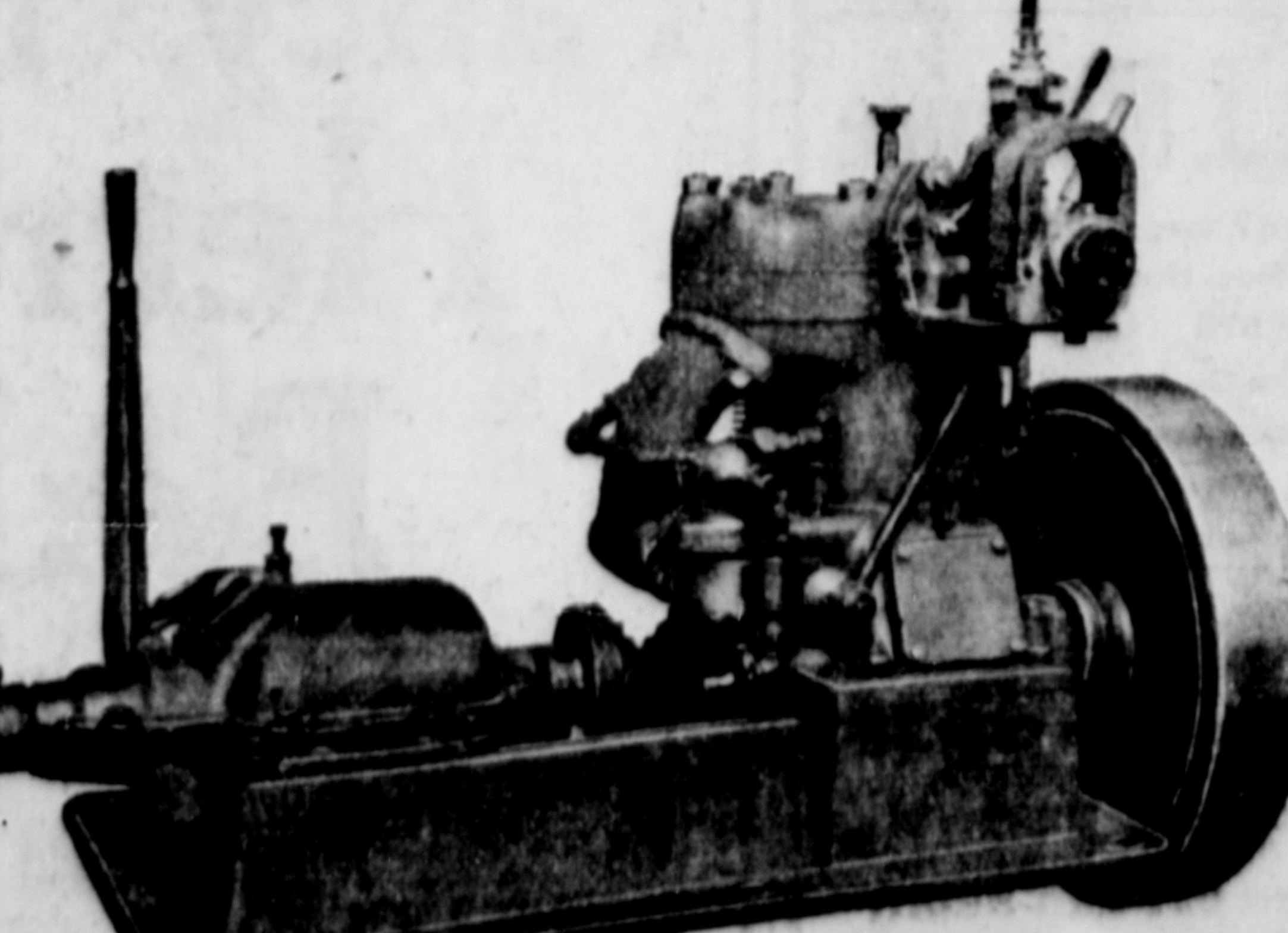
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
