Two American Schooners Marketed 101,000 Pounds of Halibut at Exchange Today.

Two American halibut schooners marketed catches totalling 101,000 pounds at the Fish Exchange this morning as follows: Helegland, 43,000 pounds, at 17.1c and 9c, to the Atlin Fisheries.

Seattle, 58,000 pounds, at 17c and 9c, to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

### CANADIANS EXCEL IN LITERARY EFFORT IS OPINION OF LIBRARIAN

LONDON, Dec. 8. — W. J. Sykes, chief librarian of the Central Carnegie Library, in an address on Canadian literature at the Normal School mentioned the names of Archibald Lampman, Wilfrid Campbell, and Dr. Duncan Campbell Scott, whose works, Mr. Sykes hoped, would soon be collected into one volume and also G. G. D. Roberts and Bliss Carman.

These five, said Mr. Sykes, were very considerable writers. Then of course there was mention of Pauline Johnson and the inimitable Henry Drummond. The works of Francis Parkman were recommended strongly in the line of history, also the Makers of Canada series, though somewhat uneven in merit, according to the speaker. John W. Dufoe's "Laurier" was mentioned in biography as more valuable than some larger biographies, though Skelton's Life of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was also commended.
