OWEN FISHER IS DISMISSED

Crown Fails to Establish Case in Liquor Selling Charge, Magistrate Decides

The crown having failed to establish a case, the charge against Owen Fisher of keeping liquor for sale at the Empress Club on October 24 was dismissed by Magistrate McLymont in the city police court this morning. W. E. Fisher prosecuted and L. W. Patmore appeared for the defence.

There were two witnesses for the crown—Chief Vickers and William Huggard of the provincial dry squad. The chief told of making a search of the Empress Social Club on October 24 and finding beer in two lockers for which permits were not produced. Liquor in other lockers were covered by permit which were produced in court. In cross-examination, Mr. Patmore showed Chief Vickers' cards which were said to have been taken off the two lockers in question and which bore the names of A. Vreath and Henry Stevens, also their permit numbers. The chief admitted that there were cards on the lockers but he could not identify the ones produced in court as being them. Chief Vickers testified as to the good character that had always been borne by the Empress Club and its manager. When other premises had been selling beer, it was known that Fisher was not.

Constable Huggard corroborated Chief Vickers' evidence and, under cross examination, identified the cards produced by Mr. Patmore as having been on the lockers.

Easily Checked

Mr. Patmore asked that the case be dismissed. The numbers on the cards posted on the lockers could have been checked from the liquor vendor. There was no evidence to show that there was anything irregular or

FELL OFF WHARF AND BROKE LEG

John Alexander Macdonald Sustained Injuries Early This Morning at Rupert Marine Ironworks

Early this morning John Alexander Macdonald, aged 65 fell from the wharf at the rear of the Rupert Marine Ironworks and broke his right leg as well as sustaining scratches on his face and forehead. He is now in the General Hospital.

The police was notified of the accident at 6:10 this morning by means of a telephone call from H. D. Robinson, manager of the Rupert Marine Ironworks. Sergeant McGlinchy called an ambulance and took Macdonald to the hospital where Dr. Cade attended him. Macdonald told the police that he was on his way to the dry dock when the accident occurred. He fell a distance of 20 feet on to the rocks when the tide was out.

MCRAE MAKES ANNUAL SPEECH IN HOUSE AND URGES INVESTIGATION

VICTORIA, Nov. 9.—John McRae, Conservative member for Yale, told the government in the Legislature to day that every Liberal member of the Legislature would win his seat at the next election if the proposal for a wide open investigation of the Pacific Great Eastern and other administrations were accepted. "But if you don't do it, not one of you will come back," concluded McRae.

LIQUOR AND BETTING MONEY TO BE DIVIDED

VICTORIA, Nov. 9.—The Government will pay out to municipalities a share of the motor license and pari-mutuel earnings in about two weeks time and a share of the liquor profits will be paid in December. Information to this effect was received by Mayor Hayward yesterday from the deputy minister of finance in reply to a request to learn when the moneys would be paid over.

VICTORIA SUPPLIES TOMATOES AND CUKES

Hot House Products Sold This Season Fetch **\$150,000**, Half Outside Province

VICTORIA, Nov. 9.—The value of the tomatoes, cucumbers, and other greenhouse commodities sold through the Victoria Hot-house Association, a body which comprises ninety-six per cent of that industry on Vancouver Island, was \$150,000 during the current season.

It appears that 33,075 crates of tomatoes, valued at \$121,694.05; 18,594 dozens of cucumbers, valued at \$25,180.74, had been disposed of in the season which has just ended. The value of flowers, lettuce and similar commodities which passed through the association's hands, was about \$4,000, making the figure stated above.

Of this large amount, which is a substantial increase on any previous year, about fifty per cent is used outside British Columbia, the bulk of the remaining mostly being consumed in Vancouver and district.

The Prince Rupert validation bill has already been reported favorably upon by the private bills committee. City solicitor Jones is in Victoria looking after the bill.
