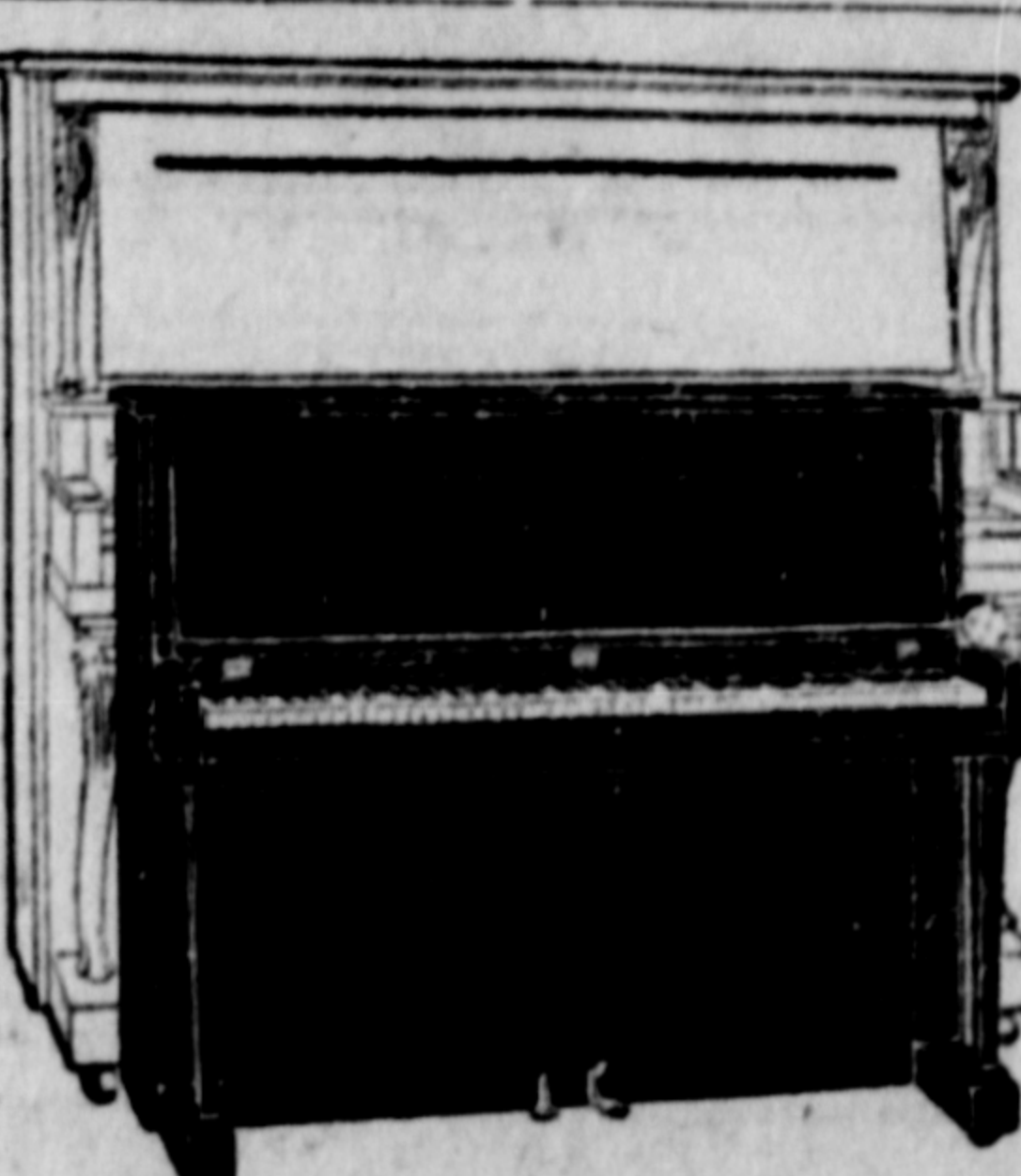

# SCHOOLBOARDS OPPOSE CHANGE

Victoria Passes Resolution Against Giving Councils Full Control of School Money

VICTORIA, Sept. 17.—A resolution asking the British Columbia Trustees' Association to combat the efforts of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities to have the control of the schools placed under the municipal councils was passed unanimously by the City School Board. The resolution was moved by Trustee P. R. Brown, who declared that as the trustees were chosen by the same electorate as were the Mayor and Council, the board was capable of handling school matters economically. The resolution read as follows:

"Whereas at the recent meeting of the Union of Municipalities, a resolution was passed requesting the Government to give to the city council of the various municipalities full control over the affairs of their respective school boards; and

"Whereas the interests of education demanded that the schools shall be maintained at least at their present state of efficiency; and

"Whereas the selecting of suitable teachers as well as the administration of the schools in general is a special business that requires great care and preparation on the part of some committee of citizens, selected for such work;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the British Columbia Trustees' Association be asked to express its disapproval of the above resolution."

### Objectionable Clause

When the resolution was originally placed before the board, it contained the following in the preamble in addition to the above: "Whereas the avowed intention of the Corporation of the City of Victoria in endeavoring to obtain control of the schools is

to reduce expenditures, irrespective of consequences."

At the suggestion of Trustee Christian Sivertz, this portion as struck out. Trustee Beckwith said that while its insertion was justified on the basis of statements made by the members of the city council, it was not always well to take these seriously. Trustee Brown consented to the deletion, but also declared that the sentiments of the aldermen were as stated. Only that morning, he said, one of the council members had told him there were hundreds of teachers walking the streets of Victoria looking for work, and the salaries should be reduced.

### Criticizes Union

The resolution in reference to the stand taken by the Union of Municipalities as seconded by Trustee Beckwith, who remarked that the union sometimes did not have much to do and so held free-for-all discussions that evoked such resolutions as that objected to by the board. He thought the time of the organization would be better spent in trying to unite the people of the various municipalities instead of dividing them. The great need in British Columbia was co-operation. He did not think that the councils of the larger centres desired to handle school business. Aldermen were complaining of too much work already.

Trustee Walter Walker supported the resolution, saying that he had served on the city council, and was now in his second year as trustee, and believed that the latter position required the most work although it was unpaid.

## PROVINCIAL BANK WILL BE DISCUSSED

Farmers' Institutes Will Press for Its Establishment and for Other Matters

Victoria, Sept. 17.—Three years ago, during the pre-election campaign, Hon. John Hart came out in favor of the establishment of a provincial bank, which will accept the savings of British Columbians and use its funds in the development of industries based on the country's natural resources.

The farmers of British Columbia, intends to make a keen fight for the establishment of a rural credits system by the Provincial Government, and they will also work for the creation of a Federal bank as well, similar to the Commonwealth Bank of Australia.

Farmers' financial problems and the provincial bank question are slated for full discussion at a special conference of the Farmers' Institutes of British Columbia, to be held in Nelson on Tuesday, October 18.

Representatives of the Farmers' Institutes who have been in close touch with members of the government regarding the banking proposal say that the matter has been shelved long enough, and that the Institutes will make a request for definite action by the Legislature.

### Charge Small Interest

They point out that if the provincial bank was operated at cost it would be able to pay deposi-

tors four per cent interest, and loan money out to the agricultural and other industries at five and one-half per cent, which would be about 2 per cent lower than the rate available from private banks at present.

The contention that government management of banks would tend towards inefficiency is answered by the farmers with the assertion that the government banks have been successful in some of the other countries where they have been undertaken.

The farmers will also ask the Legislature to afford greater assistance in the matter of co-operative marketing of agricultural products. Extension of authority for Fruit Markets Commissioner J. A. Grant on the prairies is being sought.

Reassessment of farm lands throughout the Province, representation of the agricultural interests on the Game Conservation Board, construction and maintenance of roads and educational affairs are likely to be brought before the Government during the next session of the House by the Advisory Board of the Farmers' Institutes, which meets in Victoria during the second week of the session.

## Sport Chat

George Sisler, star first baseman for the St. Louis Americans, who has been unable to appear in the line-up this year on account of eye trouble, hopes to be able to play again next year and if the condition of his eyes is satisfactory he will be appointed manager of the team. Sisler's enforced retirement, which has been one of the big disappointments of the Big League season this year, is believed to be responsible for the unfavorable standing of the Browns as compared with last year when they fought the New York Yankees a hot battle for the pennant. Jimmy Austin, coach and utility player, has been named pilot of the team but with the understanding that should Sisler be in condition next year he would be appointed manager with Austin assistant manager.

John B. Day, aged 67, founder of the New York Giants, who sacrificed a fortune to save the National League, is revealed as the victim of one of baseball's greatest tragedies. Once he occupied the position now held by Charles A. Stoneham—owner of the Giants. Now he shuffles, a paralytic, to the Polo Grounds to sit at a gate to receive the \$5 he gets each time the Giants play in New York. With Day's money, James Mutrie, himself now a penniless septuagenarian, organized the Metropolitan team in 1881. The team played in the first world's series against Providence in the Old Polo Grounds in 1884. Mutrie and Day prospered, their team became the Giants and then the Brotherhood of Ball Players organized forming an outlaw circuit in 1890. Day's players left him and he mortgaged all his possessions to obtain another team. In the end he was wiped out. For a while he managed the Giants on salary, then became an inspector of players and umpires. After being stricken with paralysis he was pensioned.

Accounts up to September 15 totalling \$51,843.49 were passed for payment by the city council last night.
