MARSHFIELD, Ore. Dec. 17-Steam schooner C. A. Smith. lumber laden, struck a submerged rock north of the jetty at the entrance to Coos Bay Harbor yesterday and is a total loss.

Nine members of the crew lost their lives when the lifeboat capsized as it was being lowered into the water.
