TAXATION CASE AGAIN APPEALED

G.T.P. Development Co. Has Taken Case Against City to Court of Appeals

The Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co., Ltd. has given notice that it is taking to the Court of Appeals the appeal against the city assessment which was decided upon in favor of the city last week by Judge Young in the County Court. The Court of Appeals sits in Victoria on June 5 and the case will likely come up at that time. In the meantime the collection of taxes for the year by the city is held up and estimates as well. The mill rate cannot be struck until all assessment appeals have been settled. To tide over the city must resort to temporary financing.

GRADING IN SECTION FIVE TO COST MORE

To make fills at the west end of Fourth and Fifth Avenues in connection with the Section 5 rough grading project it will be necessary to expend some \$1,000 or \$5,000 more than the original estimate for the work cost. This was reported to the city council last night. It was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the city solicitor to report as to the validity of adding to the original local improvement by-law.

A letter was received last night by the city council from D. J. Matheson, the newly appointed treasurer and collector, stating that he would leave Vancouver for Prince Rupert not later than April 2.

Rev. T. J. Marsh has completed his fifteenth year as Anglican minister at Terrace. Mr. Marsh arrived in 1908 at Copper City from Kitimaat and established his first mission at Kitsumkalum coming to Terrace when that place was established.

Major R. M. Taylor, district engineer for the provincial public works department, is leaving for Anyox tomorrow night and will be back Friday morning. He is accompanying J. A. Stephens, assistant district engineer, who is moving his headquarters north.

On query of Ald. Currie, Ald. Munro, chairman of the Board of Works, told the city council last night that it was the proposal of the committee to completely burn up the garbage dump on Park Avenue and seek some other means of garbage disposal. The city engineer said he would have a report on a new system as soon as possible. Ald. Collett objected to garbage being dumped indiscriminately about the rock fill on Eleventh Street.

The city council on recommendation of the finance committee, last night declined the offer of A. E. Ames & Co., Victoria stockbrokers, to sell some \$5,000 of city bonds to the city in exchange for Victory bonds. Last week it was decided to sell \$1,000 worth of January 1924 to the company, but it was later found that the city had no bonds maturing then. Therefore the action was rescinded.

The city police have received an inquiry from John Fry, Victoria chief of police, seeking information as to the whereabouts of one R. Currie, who left Victoria about a year ago to go fishing out of Prince Rupert. The information is wanted by Charles M. Currie, of Fredericton, N.B., brother. The missing man is a returned soldier. He was slightly wounded and shell shocked on active service.
