WELSH COAL OWNERS WANT CANADIAN TRADE

Making Effort to Retain That Secured During U.S. Strike

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. — (By Canadian Press) — Welsh coal exporters are making great efforts to retain the Canadian trade which they captured during the coal strike in the United States, a report to the Department of Commerce from the U.S. Consul at Swansea, Wales, declares.

This is indicated, the consul says, by the fact that several leading coal export firms in Wales recently sent representatives to Canada to lay plans for the retention of the Dominion market "in spite of the fact that formerly it has been almost exclusively held by U.S. coal exporters."

"The local press reports," the consul adds, "that one of the largest firms of coal owners and exporters of South Wales has arranged for the erection of a large crushing and screening plant for handling Welsh anthracite at Montreal. The plant is to be completed for operation soon after the opening of navigation in 1922 and is to embrace the building of an unloading wharf and erection of cranes."
