### GRAYLING IS OFF DRY DOCK

Capt. A. Swanson Will Take Frisco Gasoline Cruiser to Skagway Tomorrow

The express cruiser Grayling, owned by H. O. Harrison of San Francisco, which arrived in port aboard the steamer Princess Louise on Sunday en route to Skagway, came off the dry dock this morning after having a new steel tail shaft fitted. A twelve mile trial trip was made which proved satisfactory.

The Grayling will clear port tomorrow morning for Skagway, piloted by Capt. A. Swanson, Mr. Harrison, and her skipper, Capt. Ed. Halston, will accompany the boat.

The Grayling is being taken into Atlin Lake where Mr. Harrison will join his wife and family. The summer will be spent in cruising on Atlin and other northern interior lakes.
