LANDSLIDE AT ANYOX CARRIES AWAY BIG WATER MAIN; CAUSES SHUT DOWN

Shut Down at Anyox Caused by Land Slide Residents are Removed

(Special Despatch to Daily News)

ANYOX, Nov. 6 .- As a result of the heavy rains which commenced Saturday a landslide occurred here which swept away about fifty feet of the big six foot wooden stave flow pipe between the dam and the power house necessitating the closing down of operations at the mine and smelter for at least a week while repairs are being made.

On Sunday morning, owing to the continued downpour and the fact that the water was rising rapidly behind the almost finished Estwood multiple type dam on which so much depends,

Good Progress Made on Canadian National Railways is Shown by Financial Statement just Issued

OTTAWA, Nov. 6:-- A good showing has been made by the Canadian National Railways for the year so far and the record of gains is kept up right to the end of the month of October. There have been increases all along the line but the operating profits still come from United States lines, the Canadian lines showing a slight loss on operation so far.

The Canadian National Railways turned in a net operating revenue of \$5,011,845 in eight months of the present year ending August 31. Last year for the same period of 1922 the
