ARTHUR MEIGHEN AND HIS TOUR OF PRAIRIES

Pertinent Suggestion Made to Opposition Leader by Edmonton Paper

Mr. Meighen is to make a speaking tour of Western Canada, says the Edmonton Bulletin in an editorial article. Under normal conditions it would be supposed that his intention was to tell the people on the prairies what he thinks about the King government. Under the existing conditions that might be interesting but would hardly be relevant. Neither the government nor the opposition got enough supporters elected in the prairie provinces at last election to make a corporal's guard. If either is to make large gains, and thus help to restore political normalcy, it will have to be at the expense of the Progressives. It may be expected, therefore, that the opposition leader will devote a good deal of his time and attention to reviewing the record of the Progressive group in parliament with special reference to the numerous occasions upon which it played truant to the principles and pledges upon which it was elected and the interests of the people it was supposed to represent. It may take some courage to thus candidly present the uncomplimentary facts in quarters where they may not be relished, but that is a quality Mr. Meighen has not been accused of lacking. His tour should do something to dispel the already shaken delusion that general prosperity is to be attained through group political movements.

PRIZE IS OFFERED FOR IDEAL WOMAN

Australia Stockman Provides Legacy For Best All Round Female, Single, and Under 30

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 19.—A wealthy stockman died here recently, Peter Mitchell, who in his will left a fund for the "ideal woman." Prizes are to be distributed from time to time.

The conditions for competitors are that they must be unmarried, not over 30, of British descent, and resident in Australia. They must not be the off-spring of first cousins. The woman who is to win the prize must be cheerful and bright in disposition.

She must cut a good figure on horseback and swim well. She must be intellectually as well as physically well equipped, and she is required to have a wide range of knowledge, including the following subjects: History of the British Empire; geography of Australia; elementary anatomy and physiology; proficiency in first aid; practical housekeeping; domestic economy.

She must also have a thorough understanding of a wide range of English literature including Shakespeare, Carlyle, Dickens, Robert Burns, R. L. Stevenson and others. It is further laid down that the ideal woman's knowledge of the Bible must be sound and appreciative. Finally, she must be able to nurse babies and children.

WOULD MAKE ROADS INSTEAD OF RAILWAY

J. D. McArthur Urges Utilization of the Tar Sands of Northern Alberta

WINNIPEG, Sept. 19.—That the tar sands should be utilized to make good roads throughout western Canada, in place of building new branch railways, is the opinion of J. D. McArthur, who was a member of the party which returned to the city after a trip of inspection to the tar sand area, as guests of J. Callaghan, deputy minister of railways.

Mr. McArthur's opinion is the more notable because he has been engaged in railroad-building in western Canada practically all his life, including of course the E.D. & B.C. and A. & G. W. railways in this province.

"I have never had occasion to change the opinion I first formed of the tar sands," he said. "It has been demonstrated that they can be economically and efficiently used in road-building. Asphalt roads possess a great many advantages over concrete. They can be used immediately they are completed and they can be easily repaired. I am glad to see that the provincial government is taking up the question in a very practical way, and is laying an experimental strip along the St. Albert trail. This should be invaluable as a guide to future operations."
