Struggle Going On In Germany.

There is a great struggle going on in Germany. The Germans were overwhelmed a few years ago by allied arms and now they are putting up a strong silent protest against occupation of their territory. Their tenacity of purpose must be admired, while their refusal to pay the indemnities makes them deserving of punishment, especially in view of the fact that the taxes in that country are much lower than those in any of the countries that are said to have won the war. The winners are the ones who have been the chief sufferers from the war, both during the time it was being fought and since. Still, in spite of that, the sympathy of a great number of people goes out to the Germans on account of the way in which they are struggling and holding together in spite of the adverse circumstances under which they find themselves.

Engineer's Report On Interior Mines.

The report of J. D. Galloway on the mining conditions of the interior proves most interesting reading, not only to those who are directly interested in mining but also to those who feel that the success of the mining industry means the development of the whole country. Mr. Galloway is optimistic and says there will be a good deal of activity this year. That means much employment of miners and others in the district and consequently increased market for farm products.

What is true of the district of which Mr. Galloway is in charge is also true of the coast district where George Clothier is the district engineer. There will be more than usual activity in that district according to all the forecasts which have come to hand. This is especially true of Stewart, where a good deal of work has been going on all winter and where there will be much development in the spring.

Need Of Opening Up Coal Mines.

If Sir Henry Thornton wishes to make the G.T.P. pay dividends, there seems to be no surer way of doing it than by opening up routes to the coal properties along the line of railway. The great secret of Britain's success is the abundant and excellent quality coal measures that underlie large sections of the country and the ambition and energy which makes them develop the latent wealth. If the local coal measures were opened up and could be shipped to the coast at a reasonably low rate, we should see great developments here. The railway would find that the coal business brought other business and prosperity would follow. It has been proved in some cases, that the coal is there. What is needed now is the well directed energy that is necessary to the carrying on of any great work.

Sad Accident To Usk Residents.

The sad accident which befell Mr. and Mrs. Scully at Usk yesterday brings before us again the need of special care in the matter of fire prevention. It is easy to forget to shut off the draught in a heater or to allow loose papers or other inflammable material to lie around. It is difficult to control the fire once it starts. What is needed is great care to prevent such occurrences. Losses by fire are great and often unnecessary. The sympathy of the whole northern country will go out to Mr. and Mrs. Scully in the loss of their little child. It was bad to lose everything they had in the way of house and clothes but the great loss in the little child, that was peacefully sleeping when death overtook it, is impossible to retrieve.

Every day we read of fires destroying lives and properties and many of these, with reasonable care could be avoided.

REDUCTION IN POLICE FORCE

Two Men to be Cut Off End of March, Commission Decided Yesterday Afternoon

The police commission decided yesterday afternoon to reduce the police force from six to four members including the chief. The officers whose services will be dispensed with, will be given thirty days notice from March 1.

Chief Vickers, in reporting on the proposal of reduction to four men, said that it would be difficult to run the department with that number and it would probably be only a short time until it would be necessary to put another man back.

Mayor Newton explained that the reduction proposed would be in the nature of an experiment. Public sentiment seemed to be in favor of a reduction and he would favor trying it out. If it proved unsatisfactory and adequate protection was not being given thereby, the citizens would be responsible. In the meantime, the chief always had the power to take on specials if necessary.

Strong Sentiment

Commissioner Cameron felt that there must be protection and questioned the advisability of leaving it to the citizens to detect crime which was the duty of the police force. Not every body in the city was in favor of reduction although he admitted there was a strong sentiment that way.

Commissioner Shockley said it was not a question of what the commission wanted but what it could afford. If subsequent reports showed that more than four officers were necessary they would have to be provided. Many people were in favor of reduction and, as far as he could find, there were few against it.

Moved by Mayor

Since he had fathered the proposal for reduction, Commissioner Shockley suggested that Mayor Newton make the resolution. Accordingly His Worship withdrew from the chair and moved that the chief be asked to readjust his department along the line of a four man service including himself and in that way give the best possible service with the men at his disposal and if special circumstances warrant it the chief be empowered at any time to engage any temporary service necessary to meet the requirements. The resolution was seconded by Commissioner Shockley and passed unanimously. Commissioner Cameron stating that he was not strongly opposed to it feeling that sentiment of the public was in that direction.

ORATORICAL CONTEST PLANS ARE PREPARED

Seven Students Expected to Enter and Event Will be Open to Public

At the Rotary Club yesterday the chairman of the committee having the matter in charge reported that about seven speakers were expected to take part in the oratorical contest to be held on the evening of Friday, February 23, under the auspices of the Rotary Club in Booth Memorial School. Three of the club members would be chosen to act as judges. There would also be music supplied by students of High School.

The contest will be held in public and it is expected there will be a large attendance to hear the young speakers, especially in view of the splendid manner in which some of them acquitted themselves last year on a similar occasion.

PROTESTANTS IN POLAND DISAGREE

WARSAW, Feb. 16.—The Protestant churches of Poland have been authorized by the government, under the Polish constitution, to draw up their own statutes covering the administration of the church. Under this decision a Protestant synod was summoned and has been sitting for some time.

GUNSHOT WOUND SELF-INFLICTED

Coroners' Jury Fails to Determine Whether Corner's Death Was Premeditated or Accidental

"We, the undersigned, find that accused came to his death by a gunshot wound self-inflicted while under the influence of liquor. Whether this was premeditated or by accident is not brought out in the evidence. We recommend that the proper authorities institute a thorough investigation of places such as that in which deceased met his death."

The foregoing was the verdict brought in yesterday afternoon by the coroners' jury inquiring into the death of the late Robert Corner who shot himself on Wednesday morning in Lena Silver's house on First Avenue. Coroner J. H. McMullin presided and the jury members were C. V. Evelt, G. A. Bryant, Thomas McMeekin, Jack Judge, Bert Morrison and J. C. Gavizan.

Witnesses heard yesterday afternoon were Henry Letourneau, plumber, and William Millar, government liquor vendor.

Mr. Letourneau testified to having visited the premises of Lena Silver on Wednesday morning to repair burst water pipes. He had seen deceased who seemed to be in the best of spirits.

Bought Much Liquor

Mr. Millar testified that deceased had bought 11 bottles of whiskey and six dozen bottles of beer between February 1 and 13. He believed that he had possibly been buying liquor for Lena Silver, a regular customer, who had not been to the store since Feb. 1. Deceased had never shown any signs of intoxication while in the store and always acted in a strictly sane manner. He would say he was not a drinking man.

Deceased's bank books were brought into court. He had three accounts and there was a total of something over \$600 on deposit. There had been no withdrawals since January 22.
