HIGH SCHOOL LIT.
HEARS OF MAKING
OF A NEWSPAPERGeorge Wilson Addresses Stu-
dents, Telling of Various
Phases of Work

The High School Literary Society at their weekly session yesterday afternoon were addressed by George Wilson, business manager of the Daily News on Newspaper Work. A description of the three divisions, editorial, mechanical and business office of a modern newspaper was given, and the openings for young people were pointed out together with the necessary requisites on their part. The story of the making of a newspaper, from the news gathering point to its final selling on the street and the ultimate payment of the nickel proved interesting to the students and absorbed their attention. The address was severely practical and was based upon painfully acquired knowledge.

The economic side of the business was explained, the lecturer stating that any community will get just as good a newspaper as it pays for. He showed the fallacy of expecting to get something for nothing, which, according to Euclid, is absurd and that without the adequate support of the whole community, both in subscription and advertising revenue no newspaper could grow.
