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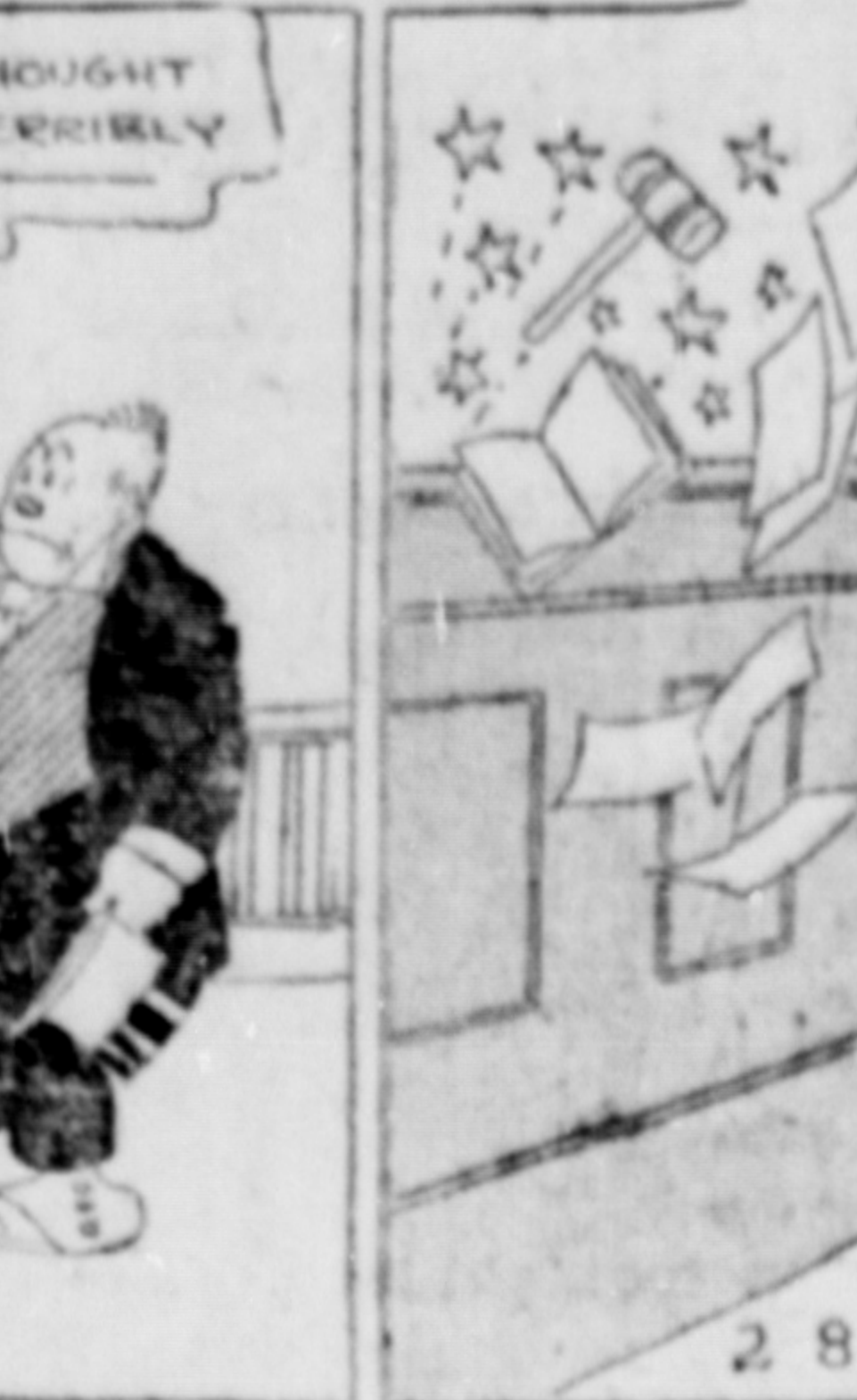

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE
IN CITY DECREASESSuperintendent Campbell Reports
Total Attendance in January
of 678 as Against 754
Last Year

There were 678 pupils in attendance at the public schools during the month of January 1923 as against 754 in January 1922 and 685 in December last according to the monthly report submitted by Superintendent H. L. Campbell to the school board last night. Mr. Campbell pointed out, however, that no receiving class had been opened this year and the actual decrease from last year would thus be 32 instead of 76 as the figures showed. There had been 16 corporal punishments. The Seal Cove school had to be closed for a couple of days on account of the cold weather. The work in all classes was progressing satisfactorily and examinations had shown good progress.

BOYS AND GIRLS OF
CHURCH GIVE BANQUETAddress Given Under Methodist
Auspices by Visitor Last
Night

The boys and girls of the Methodist Church taking up the standard efficiency training gave a banquet in the church parlors last evening to W. E. Galloway, secretary of the religious work committee. The educational council of Canada program is one adopted by the Anglican, Presbyterian, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and other churches and its aim and ideal is the creation of an ideal Canadian citizenship. Already it has been copied in the United States and in this country it has a membership of over fifty thousand.

The Girls in Training, Tuxis Boys, and Trail Rangers were responsible for the affair last night and there were 75 present.

In his address Mr. Galloway told of the aims of the organization. He said that the idea was to develop the mind, the body and the religious and social ideals. GHANDI'S PROPAGANDA
AFFECTS TEA PRICES

The doctrine of non-co-operation preached by Mr. Ghandi has had serious results on the tea industry in India—the largest tea producing country in the world. Natives under Ghandi's leadership have hindered, blocked and passively opposed British rule and authority, which made it extremely difficult for the tea planters to secure adequate numbers of coolies to pluck the tea, and once plucked, the natives have employed every means possible to hold up shipment. The result is that there is a shortage amounting approximately to 80,000,000 lbs. in the world's supply of tea. Prices are rising and all indications point to still higher figures in the near future.
