SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Free-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims to five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation occupies less than 5 years, and has made improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, to grant intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be bought, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Saturated lands, inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of purchase price, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the land under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.
