LIQUOR EXPORTERS FROM THIS PROVINCE

Eight Licenses Granted. During Month of January to Warehouses

VICTORIA, Feb. 26. — During January application was made for eight warehouse licenses and of these seven had been granted and one was pending. For each of these licenses the annual fee is ten thousand dollars. Five of the licenses were issued to the Consolidated Exporters Corporation, Ltd. Their warehouses are at Victoria, Vancouver, Grand Forks, Fernie and Prince Rupert. The sixth license was issued to the Independent Exporters, Ltd., Vancouver; the seventh to Hyman Mandel Ripstein, trading under the name of the Great West Wine Company, in which he is the sole shareholder. The eighth license, which was pending, was to Brodman's Limited, in which Philip H. Brodman and Moses Harvey Brodman own nine hundred and ninety-eight of the one thousand shares.

Sport Chat

The situation in the Men's Section of the Fraternal Whist League continues to be quite interesting and six of the ten teams still have chances for the championship. The St. Andrew's are still at the top with one point to the good over the Valhalla and Oddfellows who jointly occupy second place. In their past tournaments each of these teams won so there has been no change in the relative standing. The Sons of Canada are three points from the top with still a chance like the Sons of England and Knights of Columbus who are four points down the list. Consistent winning for each of these last three teams will be necessary to obtain at least a tie at the end of the season providing always that the St. Andrew's, Valhalla and Oddfellows meet with reverses. The Knights of Pythias, Great War Veterans' Association, Moose and Elks are now out of the running as far as the championship is concerned. The last mentioned two teams are waging a battle for the cellar.

Mass golf lessons are taking the place of individual instruction in the United States, in order to satisfy the demand for tutelage in the game, which has become so popular that the building of 200 links annually cannot fulfill requirements. Only a few years ago, golf professionals were glad if only five per cent of the then comparatively few golfers took lessons, but the craving for instruction has grown until the manifold professionals of today cannot furnish information to all comers, except by illustrating the various strokes, stances and grips to large classes, some of which number more than a thousand pupils. While thousands of golfers flocked to the tournaments to watch the experts play even after admission was charged, the fleeting glimpse of the rapidly made strokes did not satisfy, and mass instruction was demanded after hopeful dubs found that they had to serve on a waiting list to get individual instruction. Gene Sarazen of New York, national open champion, was one of the first to teach big audiences, having tutored several thousand persons in large auditoriums before his winter expedition to the Pacific coast with Jock Hutchison of Chicago, formerly British open champion.

Throughout the west Sarazen and Hutchison have been giving lessons to the multitudes. Likewise at some of the southern links prominent golfers have divulged to the hungry aspirants to better golf how the clubs should be swung. Even in the indoor schools of northern cities, bevies of golfers take inspiration from watching the manoeuvres of the professional.

Mount Robson, the highest peak of the Rockies, only twice sealed in history, is at present the scene of one of the most daring Alpine adventures ever attempted. Four young men, Jean Lambert, Charles R. Perryman, L. Sternbergh and Jacques Berques, are attempting its ascent in midwinter. These are the four young men who ascended Mount Rainier last year, being the first party to make the climb in winter.

All of the men are under 30 years of age and full of the love of adventure, which is the prime motive of their excursion. Mount Robson is 13,086 feet high and an exceptionally difficult climb under the most favorable circumstances.
