Newfoundland Suffering from Extreme Cold. Steamer Stuck Fast

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Feb. 26 .- With all coastal vessels held fast by ice packs in the harbors of the southern seaboard, Newfoundland reports indicate that the ice condition is the worst they have had in 50 years.
