CLIMBING UP MOUNT MORSE

Eleven Local Men Scale Summit and Frighten Away Game

WONDERFUL SCENERY

For five years I have been looking forward to climbing Mount Morse but there were always lions in the way. Sometimes I was too busy or had other engagements, or failing this the weather was bad or there was no one to go with or a launch was not available to take us to the other side. Yesterday, however, everything was favorable and we did it. Eleven of us, mostly boarders at the Inlander, climbed to the summit of the mountain across the harbor, some three thousand feet above sea level and found there what was to us an undiscovered country, a dream of delight. The best of it was that none of us had been there before and for that reason, perhaps we enjoyed it the more.

It is not that climbing Mount Morse is any great feat but it is one that so few people undertake and that it is so well worth doing that it is hard to tell about it in the hope that others will share the enjoyment which it gave us. A number of young ladies have reached the top at different times, but we were a stag party. There was Jimmie Faquhar, ball star, and J. W. Hamilton, better known as Hammie; Jack Johns, the commercial genius; Howard Pringle of the Cold Storage staff, well known as a sportsman; Ed. Jenner, merchant prince; S. Wrigglesworth, budding banker; A. Radbourne, another finance juggler; W. T. Battersby, wielder of the big knife; W. M. Watts, of Stork's emporium; and G. E. Foster, a tall athlete with a good voice.

Off on Time
For a wonder everybody was on time, this fact being due probably to the multitudinal efforts of Battersby who has a habit of getting Inlander boarders out of bed at unholy hours. Sharp at eight o'clock the party boarded the good launch Gwen and the little Easthope went thug-thugging up toward Tuck's Inlet, reaching the cannery at nine. Some little time was lost inquiring the way, but the best instruction we could get was to keep to the right of the creek and follow the deer paths. That is what we did.

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be off but it was not very long before heavy breathing could be heard. The going was good but it was all uphill at varying angles from almost level to nearly 75 degrees. And there was very little of it anywhere near the dead level. Being on the level does not get you uphill.

Three Nimrods

I forgot to mention that there were three nimrods in the party. They carried wicked looking rifles and at times caused much worry to those who had no such implements. Their chief value, however, lay in their use for signals, although in the course of the trip a young porcupine and several Ptarmigan were exhibited as examples of their prowess. Deer and bear, the two kinds eagerly wished for, kept carefully out of sight. Eleven irresponsible and reckless youths shouting and snorting and breathing hard and snapping off boughs and breaking dead trees, do not conduce to success in deer hunting neither do they attract bears.

Coffee at Last

After climbing nearly two hours and a half, the leaders who had been showing off somewhat in keeping well ahead of the rest, decided that it was noon and the regularity of their eating habit could not be broken. When the rear guard arrived on the scene a little curling smoke was finding its way up among the pines and lunches were being produced. Alas, however, for all the calculations of the athletes. There was no coffee and what is lunch without coffee? The reason there was no coffee was that there was no water. Although the immortal Wiggs had labored throughout to

carry an empty hard container to this point, investigation proved that the water was far below. We could hear it in the distance. However two noble patriots essayed forth with the pail and after about three quarters of an hour returned and the coffee was made and everybody happy. What was our chagrin, however, to find later that right at the top of the mountain within a few feet of the highest peak, there was the finest clear water awaiting us. We shall know better next time.

It is difficult to tell of the scene that breaks on one as he reaches the topmost peak of Morse. In one direction may be seen Kaien Island and surrounding country all laid out before him with the various waterways and lakes. Southwesterly is Digby and the Islands beyond. Toward the Pacific is the Dundas archipelago and Georgetown and Port Simpson and Alaska beyond. Northerly is range after range of mountains, with the gorge of Wark Canal well defined and splendid. Beyond it peaks and glaciers. We estimated that at least one hundred mountain peaks could be plainly seen but perhaps there were more. One glacier seemed to fill what looked like a volcano crater a mile or more in diameter. For more than an hour we drank it all in and tried in a futile way snapping of a dozen or so kodak films.

Alpine Scenery

The beauty of the view from Mount Morse is much enhanced by the alpine scenery of the mountain itself. There are crags and dells and much open space carpeted with verdure. Small meadows where deer browse were numerous. Open glades and picturesque formations—these all were in themselves sufficient attraction to induce one to climb to the top. Prince Rupert people should all go there. It is the one beauty spot that excels all others I have yet seen in this neighborhood. It can be reached by anyone who has stamina and muscle. We scarcely got wet feet and most of the travelling was on fairly dry ground. At the top there was no muskeg.

Coming down was rollicking fun for a while but toward the end there was a slowing up. I had hurt my leg and had to hang back as I got near sea level. It took me two hours to descend but some made it in an hour and a half or less. On reaching the cannery we found our launch high and dry on the mud and two hours to put in before it would be possible to get away. Happily we were able to get dinner at the cannery, through the courtesy of Manager Suther-
