

NEW FREIGHTER MOGUL ON HER WAY TO ANYOX

Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s Boat is Said to be Largest Ever Commissioned in Coastal Freighting

The Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s new freighter Mogul, formerly the Caesar, is now on her way up the coast to Anyox on her first voyage to northern waters since being acquired by her new owners. The Mogul is said to be the largest steamer that has ever entered the coastal freighting service. Her tonnage is 4200 tons and she will be used in carrying ore between Anyox, Stewart and Taconita. Her speed is 12 knots. She is due in Anyox about 3 o'clock tomorrow morning.

yet indicate the sweeping importance of the coming discussions. Especially significant is to note the consequence apparently attached to the Economic Conference. Here discussion will turn not on constitutional problems and Imperial defence, but on the equally vital questions of recovery from war, stability in currencies, on the re-establishment of normal conditions and on the extension of trade.

Defence Main Issue

It is too early yet to attempt to forecast the trend of conference discussions, but at this juncture it seems altogether likely that the main issue before the Imperial Conference proper will be that of defence. Constitutional problems and questions no doubt will be discussed. Premier Smuts has intimated that he intends to raise the question of status. His conception of the Empire, he recently told the House of Assembly of the South African Union, was a "grouping of free states held together by a common allegiance on terms of freedom and equality and operating on a basis of consultation." That was the position he had fought for, he added, and it would be "weak and foolish" to surrender the position for which he had fought. From other parts of the Empire there will no doubt come strong assertions of Dominion rights and status. None the less there is a feeling that public opinion is not yet sufficiently ripe nor—so the view is expressed—has there been sufficient discussion in parliaments

WHEN MAN MAY STRIKE WOMAN

Montreal Judge Thinks Such Action is Sometimes Justified

MONTREAL, July 28.—Chief Justice Decarie does not think that women alone are the possessors of serpent tongues, but in allowing one Pierre MacDuff, an ex-soldier, to go free he showed that he thought there were extenuating circumstances when a man strikes a woman for trying to make trouble between married couples.

The counsel for the soldier had explained that "if justice would put a penalty on the serpent tongues of women there would be fewer divorces." MacDuff, his wife and Marie Louise Roy, the complainant, were all employed in a tobacco factory when the trouble occurred. The girl had gone to Mrs. MacDuff and had told her that her husband had been giving chocolates and carrying cushions for another girl in the factory. Mrs. MacDuff broke into tears. Her husband arrived on the scene; the blow followed, although witnesses swore that the girl had avoided most of its force.

The wife in court declared that she had never doubted MacDuff before this girl's tale had reached her ears, being quite happy with him. She again looked happy when she left the court with her husband.

UNMARRIED WOMAN SHOULD EARN LIVING

It is Duty to Herself, Says Miss Margaret Wilson, Daughter of Former President

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of no more than four may acquire or adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than five years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted a temporary certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$350 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than five years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record his pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Interest on monies inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 24, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependants, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form or indicate for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
