Archie McPhail was taken seriously ill with appendicitis on Saturday and was taken to the Smithers hospital for treatment on Sunday morning's train.

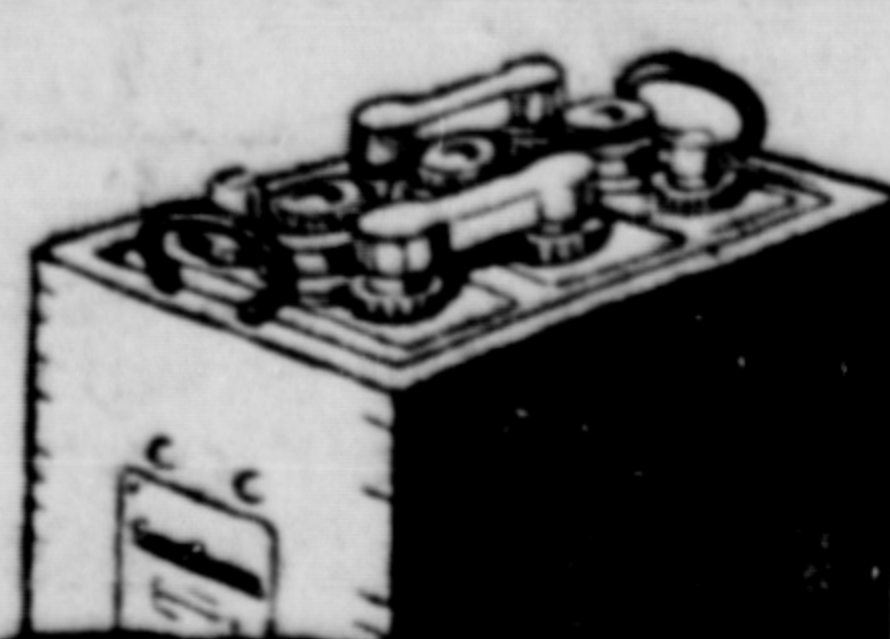
