FOUR PARTIES JUNE ELECTION

Conservatives to be Only Ones Likely to Criticize Farmer Government

TORONTO, May 8.—(By Canadian Press).—For the sixteenth time since Confederation, the electors of Ontario will during the last week in June select a new Legislature. For the second time women will take part in making that selection. What will the answer be? That is the question which is troubling a lot of members of the fifteenth legislature of Ontario as they leave Queen's Park for their homes at the prorogation.

Leaders of each of the groups profess absolute confidence of victory, but the careful observers who love to forecast such events are exceedingly doubtful at this distance. They are met by two outstanding difficulties. One is that there are really four parties—Farmers, Labor, Liberals and Conservatives. The other is that there is no outstanding difference of policy among them. The dividing lines are uncertain and indistinct.

When it is all simmered down the Drury Government goes to the country on its record as one good enough to merit a renewal of the people's confidence, while the Conservatives will make the opposite claim—that the U.F.O.-Labor Coalition should be turned out for the way it has handled things since it took over the reins of power. The Liberals will probably not be so critical of the administration but will urge that the party system would give a better management of affairs, and that the Liberal party, since it includes people of all occupations, would be able to present a stronger ministry than a group with which a large portion, particularly the professional classes, are not extensively identified. Labor will probably endorse a straight Labor platform, and those friendly to the present Coalition will claim that the present government has gone farther to meet the wish of Labor than any previous regime.

DEVELOPMENTS THIS DISTRICT

Men Sent Out by Employment Bureau to Work in Mines and Camps

A group of machine miners this morning took a contract from John R. Turner to do some tunnelling at the Duthie mine. They will leave tonight for Smithers and will commence the work immediately. Very soon there will be 125 men employed at the Duthie properties on Hudson Bay Mountain.

In addition to the Duthie properties other prospects are being worked there. Among them is one owned by the Premier Company on which 18 men are employed.

J. M. Campbell, who has charge of the local labor bureau, is sending 15 men to Alice Arm to work for the Abbotsford Logging Co. and six to Surf Inlet for the Prince Rupert Logging Co. Ten went from here to Buckley Bay on Monday. Carpenters are needed at Premier Mine and section men on the railway.

Mr. Campbell says that as soon as the snow goes at Stewart and the summer work there commences, there will be a scarcity of labor.

BIG DAMAGE ACTION TO BE HEARD HERE

Smithers School Teacher Sues Chief Lake Rancher for \$100,000

Application has been made for a change of venue from Prince George to Prince Rupert of an action for \$100,000 damages preferred by J. L. Burt, Smithers school teacher, against E. F. W. Towers, of Chief Lake, for malicious prosecution. The case is the outcome of the renting of a shack at Chief Lake by the defendant to plaintiff. It will likely be heard at the Supreme Court assizes here next month.
