

Naval Squadron Leaves Plymouth on Round the World Cruise to B.C.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 27 .- A special service squadron of the British navy in command of Vice-admiral Sir Frederick Field sailed today for a round the world cruise to last 307 days. It is proposed to take the vessels to the British Dominions, United States, and South America. The squadron is expected to visit British Columbia waters in June.

The squadron comprises the cruisers Hood, Repulse, and the light cruisers Dauntless, Dragon, Delhi and Paphne.
