## LONDON GIVES ITS OPINION PREMIER KING

The Magazine Canada Published at the Metropolis Speaks of Him and His Address

Mr. Mackenzie King, with good judgment, selected the banquet given in his honor by the old Canada Club to make a great and important speech says Canada. He took this most suitable opportunity of fully and frankly explaining matters of international politics involving a new procedure which has caused some apprehension both in Canada and the Mother Country. It is the first time in our memory of speeches by Canadian statesmen at Canada Club dinners during the last 25 years that a speech of such weighty Imperial importance has been made, and the Canadian Premier is certainly to be congratulated both on the selection of his subjects and the fine quality of his address. It was unfortunate that the most important speech at the Canada Club was made at such a late hour—that no adequate report of the Premier's speech appeared in the London Press.

directly between Ottawa and Washington. Mr. Mackenzie King showed that the matter is one of purely domestic concern to the citizens of the Pacific sea-board of the two countries, and he took particular and explicit care to emphasize his cordial adherence to the policy that no individual action should be taken by any part of the British Empire on matters of vital concern to other parts of the Empire "without the full knowledge and consent of all."

**Broad and Scholarly**  
His speech was noteworthy also for the broad and scholarly way in which he traced the growth of Canada up from the beginnings of its history as a Crown Colony to its present national status, and he took the example of the different Provinces of the Dominion working out their representative institutions as "emblematic of the League of Nations which makes up the British Empire." From the racial and other diversities he claimed that the leaders of Canada had "learnt, how to bring out of these differences a unity which emphasises the things which we have in common rather than the things which divide," and from this, he claimed, "we have learnt how to live and let live and how to forget and forgive."

Mr. Mackenzie King in his policy and in his speeches, evidences a pride in and love of Canada equal to that evinced by any of his predecessors, and in this speech he showed the imagination of a statesman, rather than of a politician, in the value he attached to the historical archives which have been so splendidly augmented by the gifts of Lord Durham and Sir Leicester Harnsworth. The Durham papers he regarded as so important that "a not inconsiderable part of their history would have to be re-written from these original records." Mr. Mackenzie King profoundly realises the powerful influence which knowledge of and pride in Canada's early constitutional history can exert in raising the Canadian people to their fullest national stature; he feels that their well-justified belief in the enormous possibilities of Canada's future development will thus be best informed and tempered.

The Canada Club well justifies its existence when it thus provides an occasion for public utterances so authoritative and friendly before an audience that can appreciate their import.

## CUBA CUTS DOWN INFLUX OF CHINESE

Restrictions Imposed on Entry Bars all Except Students and Others

HAVANA, Nov. 27.—Restrictions imposed upon the entry of Chinese immigrants into Cuba have cut down the influx so that within the last ten months only 212 have entered as compared with 1,212 during the previous ten months. The present Cuban law is similar to the United States law and bars laborers, but admits under restrictions merchants, students and tourists.

Several thousand Chinese were admitted under special legislation during the world war to work in the cane fields but most of them soon drifted to Havana where they made their living by operating laundries, keeping small shops and peddling vegetables and merchandise. A number of them also conduct truck farms in the suburbs.

Havana has developed a "Chinese Quarter" that extends for several blocks and it is estimated that the city has about 50,000 Chinese.

## TEMPORARY FREEDOM IN ORDER TO MARRY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—The cell doors of the District of Columbia jail have swung open twice for Miss Gladys Peyton, 19—once to permit her to marry, the second time to give her temporary freedom.

Miss Peyton, a stenographer, was sentenced recently to a year's imprisonment for forgery. Frederick Ewers, salesman and her fiancé, married her by special permission. The bridal party, as arranged, returned to the jail and Mrs. Ewers went to her cell.

An hour later the bride received her first wedding present, the Criminal Court permitting her to leave under the custody of her attorney when she changed her former plea of guilty to not guilty.

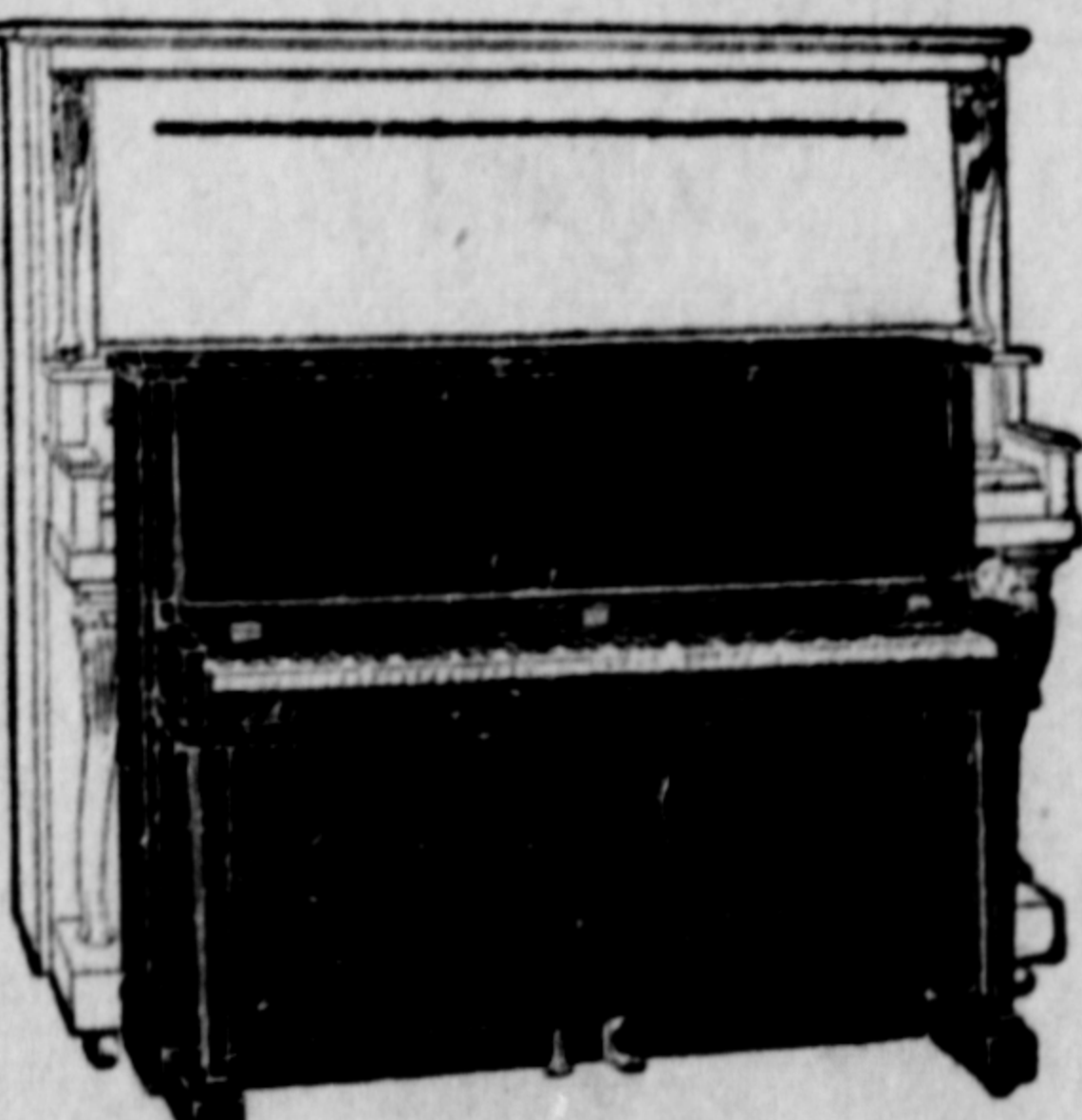
