FISH ARRIVALS

Not Enough Cars to Handle all Halibut Offering This Morning

Six American schooners marketed 75,000 pounds and thirteen Canadian schooners marketed 107,300 pounds, a total of 182,000 pounds of halibut at the Fish Exchange this morning. The eastern demand in the home market remaining firm, the Canadians obtained practically the same prices as did the Americans for first class catches while for second class fish the home boats received from 1c to 1 1/2c more. Two boats marketed 3,300 pounds of salmon.

The refrigerator car shortage is still causing some anxiety to the fish buyers and only three cars were spotted today. It is expected that the car shortage will be solved within the next few days when additional refrigerator cars will arrive from Winnipeg.
