## B.C. GOVERNMENT'S POLICY ON RELIEF PREMIER TOLMIE IN FAVOR OF BARTERING WITH RUSSIA

### Promises No Person Needing Necessities of Life Will Suffer

Victoria Replies to Memorial of Union of British Columbia Municipalities—Intends to Stand by Relief Scale Which Was Announced Recently

VICTORIA, Dec. 30: (Canadian Press)—The provincial government's reply to the memorial submitted by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities dealing with unemployment relief reiterates the policy that no bona fide needy person should suffer through lack of necessities of life and offers to work in fullest co-operation with cities and municipalities to alleviate distress. But it reminds the municipalities that each must bear its full share of responsibility. The government indicates that it intends to stand by the relief scale which it announced recently.

### Thirteen Miners Killed by Blast In Hungary Mine

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 30:—Thirteen miners were killed and one was seriously injured in an explosion in a colliery near here yesterday.

### CALLS HIS FAST OFF

Gandhi Believes That All Concerned Are Doing Their Best Towards Removal of Ban

POONA, India, Dec. 30: (Canadian Press)—Mahatma Gandhi announced yesterday that his proposed fast of protest against the ban on entry of India's "untouchables" into Guruvayoor Temple would be postponed.

The Nationalist leader is believed to be satisfied that all concerned are doing their best toward a removal of the ban.

### Indian Prisoners Are to be Freed New Year's Day

BOMBAY, India, Dec. 30:—Many political prisoners in India are expected to be released on New Year's Day by order of the British government.

### INDEPENDENCE FOR PHILIPPINES VOTED BY REPRESENTATIVES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 30:—By a vote of 171 to 16, the House of Representatives yesterday approved independence for the Philippines after a 10-year transitional period during which there would be a commonwealth government responsible to Washington. It is believed in political circles that the bill may be vetoed by President Hoover who believes that the Philippines are not yet ready for independence.

### PERISHED IN CABIN

G. Gagnon, French-Canadian Placer Miner, is Found Dead On Islands

SKIDEGATE, Dec. 30:—G. Gagnon, a placer miner, who has been living and working on the east coast of Graham Island, was found dead in his cabin by a neighbor a few days ago. It was evident that Mr. Gagnon had been taken ill and could not get out to procure firewood. He tore off the ceiling and floor of the cabin for wood until he became too weak to do anything for himself. He is believed to have been dead for ten days when he was found. An investigation was made by Constable C. G. Sharpe of Queen Charlotte City.

### Commander of Marines Dies

SHANGHAI, China, Dec. 30:—With impressive military and naval rites, the funeral took place here yesterday of Col. Richard Stewart Hunter, commanding officer of the United States Marines, who died earlier in the week. Col. Hunter played an important part in the policing of the international settlement here last winter during the Japanese invasion of this port.

### Trinidad Lepers See Pyrotechnics

Fireworks Display Was One of Christmas Season Treats

### INSULL IS FREE MAN

Will Remain in Athens Indefinitely Following Release—Health is Much Improved Now

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 30:—The Department of State is awaiting a formal explanation from Athens as to the reasons for the refusal of Greek courts to permit the extradition of Samuel Insull, former Chicago utilities magnate, who was indicted a few months ago by a Cook County grand jury on charges of conspiracy and embezzlement.

### His Health Better

ATHENS, Dec. 30:—Prominent Greek physicians, after examining Samuel Insull, extradition of whom to the United States was refused by Greek courts earlier in the week, stated yesterday that the former utilities magnate had shown a noticeable improvement in health since his arrival in Greece and should live at least ten years longer. Following the granting of his freedom by the Greek courts, it is understood that Insull will continue to reside indefinitely in Greece.

### DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Mike Purisch, Aged 28, Lost His Life at Premier When Raise Collapsed Throwing Him Down Shute

Mike Jurisch, 28-year old Jugoslav miner, was killed in the Premier mine on December 26 when a raise collapsed and precipitated him down a shute, according to information received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here.

At an inquest conducted by Dr. Vosburgh of Stewart, coroner, a jury, of which John Drysdale was foreman, found that Jurisch's death had been due to accidental causes. Deceased has a brother in Vancouver.

### HOOVER INVITED

Japan to Ask United States Chief Executive to Make Economic Survey of Country

TOKYO, Japan, Dec. 30:—It was announced here yesterday that the Japanese government would invite President Herbert Hoover, on expiry of his term of office next spring as chief executive of the United States, to visit this country and make a complete survey with a view to expressing his views on national economic matters and possibilities of rehabilitation.

Not only would the Japanese government obtain valuable advice from Mr. Hoover but the gesture would serve to cement American-Japanese friendly relations, it is believed.

### Drowning Fatality At Napier Harbor

Ten Persons Lose Lives When Launch and Steamer Collide at New Zealand Port

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Dec. 30: (Canadian Press)—Ten persons were drowned when a launch carrying thirty workers collided with a small steamer in Napier Harbor.

### BURNABY SCHOOLS TO REMAIN CLOSED; NO FUEL AVAILABLE

VANCOUVER, Dec. 30:—Owing to lack of fuel which the municipality has no money to buy, it is probable that a number of schools in the municipality of Burnaby, which is going into voluntary receivership, will not be re-opened next week at the conclusion of the Christmas and New Year holiday.

### HE GOT RECEIPT

Another Disclosure Made in Connection With Lindbergh Kidnapping Case

NEW YORK, Dec. 30:—It was revealed yesterday by Dr. (Jafis) John F. Condon, personal negotiator for Col. Charles A. Lindbergh in the Lindbergh baby abduction case of last April, that he was given a receipt by the man named "John" to whom he paid over \$50,000 ransom money in the Bronx on the understanding that the child would be returned safely to his parents. Later he turned the receipt over to Col. Lindbergh, Dr. Condon said.

The bride, who was dressed in a suit of pea green crepe, was attended by Mrs. R. W. Scherk while the groomsmen were R. W. Scherk. Mr. and Mrs. Joyce will reside at Seal Cove where they will have the hearty congratulations and best wishes of many friends.

The groom, until recently, was pastor of the local Pentecostal Mission and has been a resident of Prince Rupert for some years. The bride has lived here since girlhood, having attended the schools of the city.

### Head of Provincial Government Glad to Welcome Customers

Believes in Trading With Anyone Who Will Trade With This Country on Satisfactory Basis—To go Into Whole Matter at Ottawa

VICTORIA, Dec. 30: (Canadian Press)—The general principle of bartering with Russia is approved by Premier S. F. Tolmie of British Columbia who states that "anything that will turn our products into cash will be very welcome at this time. I firmly believe in trading with anyone who will trade with us on a satisfactory basis. I intend to go fully into the matter when I go to Ottawa next month."

### STRENGTH IN MART

Issues Bounded up in Late Trading Yesterday With Substantial Gains for Day

NEW YORK, Dec. 30:—Staging a last-minute rally, stocks jumped from one to three points in trading on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday when 1,606,430 shares changed hands. Industrials closed at an average of 59.12, up 1.27; rails at 25.40, up .71; utilities at 27.18, up .50, and bonds at 77.01, up .16.

### HENRY IS INDICTED

Sixteen Charges of Grand Theft and Eight of Forgery Laid Against Pasadena Broker

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30:—A secret indictment against Leslie B. Henry, prominent Pasadena broker, clubman and civic leader, on sixteen counts of grand theft and eight counts of forgery, was returned by the county grand jury yesterday as a result of Henry's alleged embezzlement of securities to the value of \$75,000 belonging to Mrs. Charlotte Shelby, mother of Mary Miles Minter, former moving picture star. Henry, who was formerly Mrs. Shelby's financial agent, was released on \$50,000 bail pending his trial which will take place in February.

### Reorganization Of Golden Gate Bridge Project

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30:—Following the resignation of Allan Donald as general manager of the project, a complete reorganization of administration of the construction of the new Golden Gate bridge here is anticipated. Mr. Donald resigned after the board had voted to reduce his salary from \$25,000 to \$12,000 per year, also requiring that he devote his entire time to the organization and maintain his headquarters at the bridge site.

### Oakland Dye Plant Destroyed by Fire

Three Buildings and Five Box Cars Wiped Out in Conflagration Yesterday

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 30:—Three buildings of the Western Dye Casting Co. and five box cars were destroyed by fire which visited the plant yesterday. Damage is estimated at \$75,000.

### Boncour Defeat Averted Safely

French Senate Finance Committee Passes Large Appropriation For Current Expenses

PARIS, Dec. 30:—Danger of the new government of Premier Paul Joseph Boncour being defeated was averted yesterday when the finance committee of the Senate approved an appropriation of five billion francs for current governmental expenses.

### Silver Price At Low Ebb

Descended to 24 1/4 Per Ounce on New York Metal Market Yesterday

### FORT ERIE TO GET BUFFALO BUSINESS

FORT ERIE, Ont., Dec. 30:—Construction of at least one large grain elevator here is expected to follow the ban which has been placed by British customs authorities as far as the Imperial preference is concerned upon Canadian wheat which has been stored in United States elevators prior to being reconsigned to Empire countries. Buffalo, across the river from here, in the past has handled much Canadian wheat bound for the United Kingdom.
