Dempsey-Gibbons Battle on July Fourth will be Good Exhibition but Latter will Lose by Eighth

In the little town of Shelby, Montana, known only in the past as "Shelby Junction," Tommy Gibbons, of St. Paul, Minnesota, on the morning of July 3, in a 24-foot ring, will attempt to turn back the hands of time and reverse the old saying which has been handed down to us for generations that "Youth must be served." Tommy says, "No, age must predominate." He either believes what he says or must have been dreaming of Barnum who said that the public liked to be humbugged.

However, there is no doubt that it will be a great sporting event. Men and women from all over Canada and the United States will gather together on the burning sands of that little Montana town to see what I would term two of the most scientific exponents of modern boxing meeting for the world's heavyweight championship. Both are possessors of terrific punches and they are evenly matched in size, reach and ring generalship.

No doubt the great audience will be treated to one of the finest exhibitions of the manly art of self defence that has ever been witnessed in any ring since the memorable battle between James J. Corbett and Robert Fitzsimmons on March 17, 1897, at Carson City, Nevada, when the latter won in the fourteenth round. In some ways the forthcoming Fourth of July fight compares with the Carson City affair. The challenger in that case was 35 years of age and was the lighter man. The same can be said in Gibbons' case now. He is the older man and is thirteen pounds lighter than Dempsey. In the Carson City battle, the challenger was pitted against a very clever boxer, the father of modern boxing but the latter lacked the punch to put his opponent away. In Dempsey's case, however, it is just the opposite. Dempsey's punch has made him the great boxer that he is today and that alone will cause Gibbons' downfall on July 4.

that Gibbons was born at St. Paul, Minnesota, on March 22, 1889, and Dempsey was born at Manassa, Colorado, on June 27, 1895. The former is 34 years of age and the latter, 28, a difference of six years and not four as many writers have stated.

Dempsey has met Fulton, Miske, Brennan and Levinsky and knocked them all out. Gibbons has met the same men but has defeated not by knockouts but by points. This goes to show who has the hardest punch when opposed to a fighter of class.

Fight Will End in Sixth

Gibbons will put a better fight than Carpentier and will take more punishment, being better built. He will also land some very effective punches but Dempsey will defeat him in clinches. He will become easy prey for Dempsey on the breaks with short punches. Gibbons will have the same opportunities here but he will lack the punch in the infighting as his record will show. All Gibbons' knockouts came at long range. From a moving picture standpoint, it will be a great fight if it goes six rounds which it may.
