## ANYOX BEATS KETCHIKAN

Visiting American Ball Team Goes Down Before Canadian Boys from North

ANYOX, July 4.—In order to help make an Anyox holiday, a strong aggregation of ball tossers journeyed all the way from Ketchikan, arriving here a few hours before the game was scheduled to take place. In a game of baseball which would be hard to duplicate anywhere, and which was witnessed by a large turnout of fans, the weather being ideal, Anyox All Stars beat the boys from the American town by the slight margin of one run, the score standing five to four at the end of the ninth. It was almost errorless ball, and provided a sensation when, in the last of the seventh, with Ketchikan one run to the good, Anderson for Anyox, with C. Ferguson and Brown on first and second bases respectively, drove the longest hit of the season to deep left, where it dropped into the water of Hidden Creek, which bounds that section of the ball grounds.
