In every, newspaper office there is constant difference of opinion between the management and those who want advertising published without cost in the news columns. Also there is a constant stream of matter that comes through the mail that is really advertising and that it is attempted to get im as news. This finds its way into the waste paper basket.

The management of the newspaper judges whether matter is news or advertising. News is published free of cost. Advertising matter must be paid for if published.
