The difficulty is to be able to see ahead and plan to make the most of the information to hand.

Men who have made big fortunes are the far seeing ones. They have looked ahead beyond tomorrow and have backed their judgment. Most of us when we back our judgment find that we lose out. In other words our judgment is faulty.

Looking Ahead at
Future Of City.

There are a good many people in the city today who, because things are quiet, do not look far enough ahead to see that a change is bound to come soon. They cannot visualize the future, being too much wrapped up in the present. It is always difficult for a man who is losing money every day to keep optimistic and see a silver lining to the dark business cloud. The waiting game is a slow and tedious one, but it is well to remember the old saying, "Everything comes to him who waits."

Prince Rupert is a good bet. The city is worth banking on for the future. The people who are giving up are those who banked once and banked heavy and lost. The thing to do is to revise all former estimates and expectations and base the predictions on the outlook of today. That outlook is bright.

Keep Up Bars
Against Titles.

Canadians want no titles. A few individuals are pleased to be singled out as superior to their fellows, but the mass of the people are opposed to the whole system.

If it were possible to grant titles justly there would be no great objection to it, but the amount of money a person possesses and the manner of his spending it is a very large factor in bringing titular reward. The result has been that the men who held titles have been very far from the best men in the country.

What is true in Canada is true in Great Britain. There, many of the best men have consistently refused to accept titles. W. E. Gladstone was an outstanding example of this and David Lloyd George is another. The title next in rank to a prince is a duke and yet few of the dukes have been of outstanding ability. Arthur Wellesley was made a Duke after the battle of Waterloo, but the Duke of Wellington is one of the few outstanding figures in recent British history of men who have been great men and also Dukes.

The news despatches this morning tell of an effort being made to lower the bar against titles. It is to be hoped that the House of Commons will sit tight and refuse to allow any change. Service is its own reward. Most of the people of the country serve well and many with outstanding ability in their several spheres. To single out a few who happen to be rich or whose deeds happen to be more spectacular than those of others, is not in line with modern trend.

Manson Victory
In Oriental Case.

The winning of the case before the Privy Council yesterday was a distinct victory for Attorney General Manson. It was his decision to appeal the case or at any rate it was done on his advice, as the legal adviser to the government. That he won is satisfactory for it shows that the province still has some power to manage its own affairs without interference from Ottawa.

SAN FITZGERALD IS
BACK WITH CASH TO
DEVELOP HIS MINES

Sam Fitzgerald, one of the owners of the Independence group of mineral claims on Goose Creek, Portland Canal district, about 12 miles north of Stewart, has arrived from Los Angeles on his way north, says the Vancouver World. He succeeded in interesting capital in his ventures, not only the Goose Creek claims, but the Titan group on Fish Creek, Alaska side of the Salmon River. Twelve claims comprise the Independence group and a tunnel has been driven in ore for approximately 160 feet. This vein is 18 feet wide where crosscut and the assay returns have shown gold, silver, lead and copper values.

The development of the Independence is another evidence of the faith of the prospector. Mr. Fitzgerald and his brother Jack located this property some years ago and have carried on their annual development work ever since. At one time a Belgian syndicate used a diamond drill but did not complete their option, saying the drill had not shown up to expectations. But, in spite of this, the owners continued on the miner's theory of "follow the ore," with the gratifying result that a large mineralized body has been opened at a depth of approximately 150 feet.

USE OF LOCAL
LUMBER URGED

After Hearing Representations of
Timbermen's Association,
Council Calls for Hem-
lock Tenders

Representations made by a delegation from the Northern B.C. Timbermen's Association at last night's council meeting resulted in the opening of tenders for some quarter of a million feet of fir lumber being deferred for a week until mills of the district have been given the opportunity of tendering on western hemlock which the delegation claimed was equally good for the city's purpose as the fir which had been exclusively asked for subsequently. The delegation consisted of W. E. Williams, secretary of the Northern B.C. Timbermen's Association, Olof Hansen, R. E. Allen and J. R. Morgan, directors.

Mr. Williams at some length submitted statements and figures to prove to the council that western hemlock would meet the needs of the city quite as satisfactorily and perhaps more economically than fir at the same time supporting an industry directly tributary to the city. Reports from the Canadian National railway, research bureaus and commercial users of hemlock were presented showing that western hemlock had all the qualities of durability and long life equal to those possessed by common fir.

Discriminating

Olof Hansen said that it was discriminating against home industry not to give western hemlock a chance. If it was not bought at home it would tend to injure the Eastern trade which was steadily developing.

R. E. Allen said all the local mills wanted was a square deal. If fir could be bought cheaper than hemlock then by all means the council was justified in buying it. He pointed out that no fir was produced north of Dean Channel.

Mayor Newton, Ald. Collart, Ald. Munro and Ald. Perry expressed the opinion that all things being equal or nearly so the local product should be bought. It was moved by Ald. Collart and Ald. Perry that the tenders be laid over for a week to give the district millmen the opportunity of tendering.

RAILWAY COMPANY'S
ASSESSMENT OFFER
REJECTED BY CITY

The offer of the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. to turn over to the city its lots in Sections 3, 4 and 9 for the nominal sum of \$1 in return for certain assessment concessions was rejected by the city council last night on recommendation of the board of works. A telegram had been received from R. R. Nicholl, G.T.P. taxation commissioner, asking for the city's decision on assessment appeals entered by the company. This will be answered as soon as the court of revision has made its final disposition of the appeals.

Judge Young left on last night's train for Smithers where he will preside over County Court sessions.

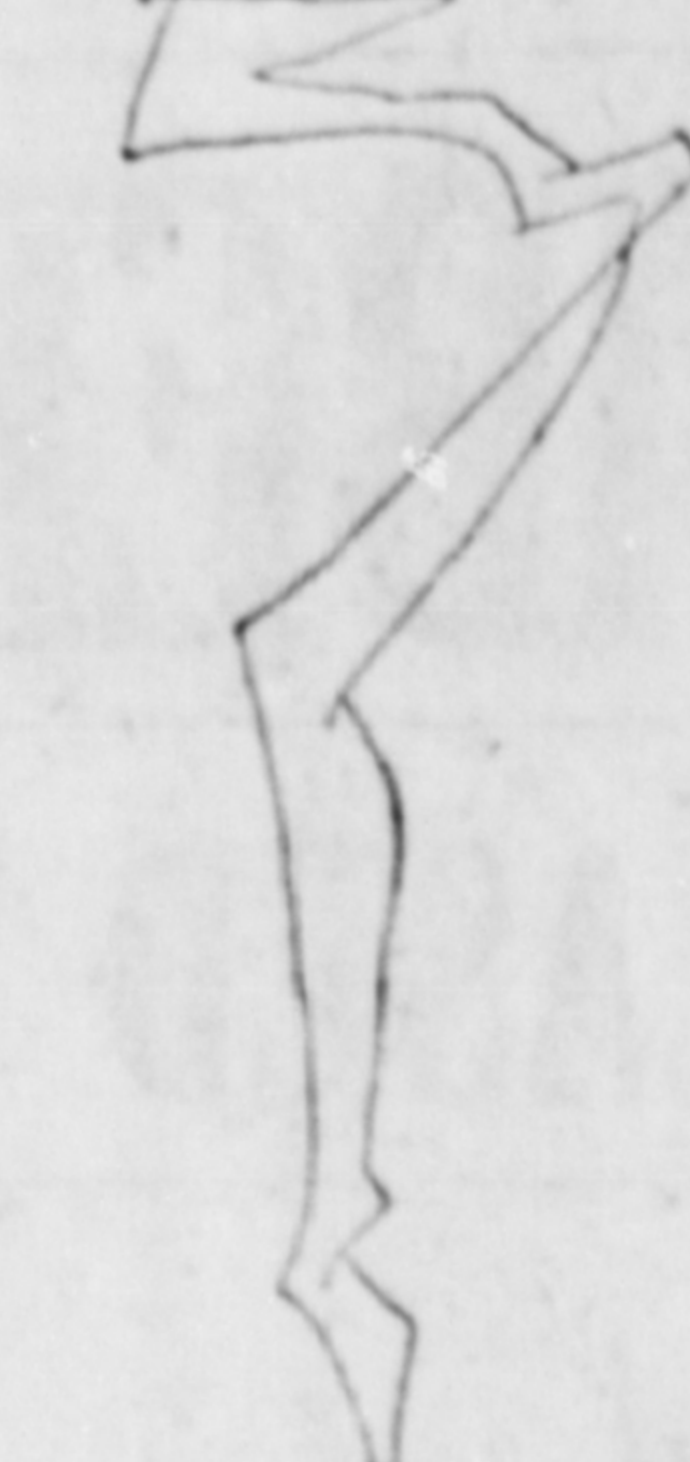


NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.
