TROLLING BOAT MARY B. SANK AT CANNERY

Cut by Ice Quadra Bay and Then Went Down Far as Ropes Allow

KETCHIKAN, Feb. 20.—The 41-ton trolling boat Mary B., owned by the Northwestern Fisheries Company, hangs submerged in the waters of Quadra Bay with just the tops of her masts out of the water.

Captain and Mrs. Robert Pringle left for the Quadra cannery, 42 miles south of Ketchikan, on Quadra Bay, en route to this city to catch the Alameda south. When not more than 100 yards from the dock the Mary B., in bucking the ice between the dock and the open waters of the bay sprang a leak. Captain Pringle, on going below, discovered water pouring into the engine room, and immediately turned back. The boat was tied as quickly as possible to the dock and the salvaging of valuables on board was continued until she had begun to sink rapidly. Mrs. Pringle worked until the last minute and was the last to leave the sinking craft. She succeeded in rescuing all of her belongings and many of the boat's most valuable assets.

The Mary B. sank as far as the ropes with which she had been tied to the dock would permit, and now hangs there, where she will remain until the arrival of the cannery crew, with tackle to raise her.

Rammed Through Ice
The Pringles left the cannery shortly after the sinking of the Mary B. Their second attempt was made in the Louise 2, which

According to an eye witness of the accident to the Mary B., all on board were extremely fortunate that the accident happened so near to the dock; for, had she made shore before going down, and the experience, while it might not have proved fatal to any on board, would have been extremely uncomfortable in the bitter cold of the northeast gale and the temperature of 9 or 10 above zero.

Sport Chat

Last Tuesday night's postponed basketball games are to take place in the Exhibition Hall this evening according to the present intention of the Association management. The following teams will play: Ladies League—Adanacs vs. Kaiens; Intermediate League, Colts vs. Elks. The Ladies' game will be a preliminary to the battle-royal which will take place on Friday night when the Maple Leafs and Adanacs meet in a game in which the season's championship will be at stake.

A body of Athletes, thoroughly representative of all the national sports of Great Britain will be sent to Paris to compete in the Olympic Games of 1924. This decision was taken recently at London in a meeting of leading men in sport, commerce, the professions and public life called together by the British Olympic Club after a full discussion for and against Olympic games. It was agreed that it was most desirable, in the interests of good relations with France, as well as in the interests of sport, that Great Britain should continue to participate in the games. In this way the British Olympic Council hopes to regain for Great Britain the prestige she formerly enjoyed in international games and demonstrate her spirit of sportsmanship. Lord Birkenhead has been chosen to head the committee to arrange finances for the sending of British representation and King George has consented to become president.

Ability to beat the Brooklyn Club has been the outstanding feature of the play of the Cincinnati Club, National League runner-up in 1922, during the long career in the Heydler circuit. In thirty-three years of competition with the Dodgers, Cincinnati has won twenty series, lost only eight and tied five. Cincinnati's showing with the other team of Greater New York, the Giants, has been diametrically the opposite. They won eight series from the Giants, lost twenty-two and tied three. Cincinnati was one of the eight original cities in the circuit when the National League was organized in 1876 but it was not until Pat Morgan's regime as manager in 1919 that the Reds won their first pennant. The Reds finished second in 1878 and did not land in that position again until 1922 when victory in a double-header on the closing day of the season gave them

second place. During its thirty-eight years in the National League, the Cincinnati team has won 2,188 games and lost 2,312 for a per centage of .486, a single per centage point behind the fourth place Phillies in the life time standing of the clubs.

A Senior basketball game is being staged tonight which should provide plenty of thrills for the interested fans. The quintette which will leave for Anyox on Wednesday night to draw first blood with the smelter boys will play a picked aggregation from the rest of the League. Both squads are out to test their powers and the rivalry which has lasted since the last clash will be keener than ever. There is to be a Junior League game between the Colts and the Falcons as well.
